# Spiritual Motherhood

Julia Ward Howe was a creative 19<sup>th</sup> century Unitarian. She awoke after a visit to see the Union troops to write the six verses to "The Battle Hymn of the Republic." Twelve years later, however, she penned a Mother's Day proclamation for peace---inviting an international gathering of women on June 2 to bring qualities of motherhood: compassion, patience, caring for one's family, active citizenship. She had a vision of spiritual motherhood that involved citizens "exerting influence and watchfulness in all the walks of life....(giving every person) a noble part to perform in the great drama of the world." Her goal was world peace. On this Mother's Day, we celebrate spiritual motherhood past and present. Senator Rich Madaleno will speak on creativity, compassion, and citizenship in our second service.

#### **CLARE'S COLLOQUY**

Our spiritual question for May is, "What does it mean to be a people of creativity?"

A TUUC member reminded me, recently, that creative people have ideas. He wrote to say he would like to gift me and Don with eight canna lily rhizomes that had wintered over in his basement. He wrote how they like the sun and the hummingbirds like them. He added, "They will be taller than you."

Creative people are action oriented. This member ended his generous offer of the canna lily rhizomes with one more offer---- to help plant them. Sure enough, Sean Mackey appeared with a dog on a leash and a garden hoe in one hand and a bright yellow bag containing about 20 canna lily rhizomes and a trowel in the other.

Creative people are wise from practice. After studying the trajectory of light across our backyard, Sean pointed to where we would plant the canna lily rhizomes that they might receive the fullest sunlight.

Creative people are energetic and enthusiastic about creating something new. We set to work. Sean did most of the work of planting with the garden hoe. But I made a small contribution with the trowel!

Creative people have a sense of accomplishment. After sculpting and

patting the earth, Sean rinsed his hands in water from the garden hose, packed up his tools, untied his dog from the wisteria, and returned to his car.

This month we are exploring what it means to be a people of creativity in terms of experimenting with new ideas; acting on our values of caring and nurturing; joining our wisdom, practices, energy and talents to create beloved community; and honoring the sense of accomplishment brought by being a people of creativity.

As I type, the headlines are filled with news that President Trump has decided to pull the United States out of the Iran nuclear deal. I do not know where this news will lead us in terms of our nation's relationship to much of the world.

Thanks to Sean Mackey, I do know where to look for green sprouts, and, hopefully later in the summer, hummingbirds flying around red canna lilies.

And I do know where to look for visionary, supportive, hard-working, wise, enthusiastic people who come together "to create a world more fair with all her people one."

#### THOUGHTS FROM THE BOARD

If you were to found an organization, what would it be? What would be its purpose or its mission? How would you structure it to achieve that mission? What if that organization was a religious community? What would it look like?

Would it consist of people of many different ages, genders, or ethnicities and from a variety of professions and socio-economic circumstances? How would you organize the leadership of that community to achieve and maintain diversity?

The question for May is "how do we be a people of creativity?" With the emerging blossoms of a resurrected earth all around us, we are reminded that creation is an ongoing and not a one-time act and that to sustain life we must continually change to adapt to changing circumstances. We must create and recreate. For organizations, this means constantly examining internal processes against the mission and vision of the organization.

Organizations achieve their missions and vision through governance that is tailored to their purpose. It's like choosing a pickup truck to haul a bulk load of mulch over a Prius sedan. While governance structures can be tools for empowerment, they can also be tools for oppression.

How we structure relationships of power and authority in a group reflects our values and our deepest and usually subconscious beliefs about the nature of humanity.

Unfortunately, governance systems can, and often do, institutionalize implicit biases.

Therefore, if TUUC is to be a community of creativity and fulfill its mission of deepening

"our ethical and spiritual lives together as we work for racial, social and environmental justice," we must be willing to assess our current governance.

TUUC must be willing to ask the hard question of how, in spite of our sincerest conscious desire to be allies to the marginalized, we the members have unwittingly perpetuated systems of injustice even within our walls.

Over the last two years, the TUUC Board has been educating itself on governance and examining TUUC's current governance structure with the help of the UUA.
Rev. David Pyle of the UUA prepared a governance assessment last year as part of that effort.

The governance assessment concluded that the current structure encourages the formation of silos within the church, which promotes in turn unhealthy competition, distrust, blaming, and anxiety, while inhibiting diversity and growth.

Rev. Pyle made several recommendations that the Board has adopted in creating a new governance structure through the Governance Task Force.

In offering a new TUUC governance structure, the TUUC Board is not disparaging the work of many individuals in this congregation to further social justice over the last decade, but lifting that work up and supporting it by asking how we can be more effective as an organization. The proposed governance structure seeks to empower members to be the change they seek by creating stronger connections among us.

This governance model clearly defines roles and responsibilities to prevent overlap of efforts, to streamline communication between governing, administrative, and programming bodies, and to foster greater coordination and unity of purpose in forwarding our mission.



### **OUR GOUCHER STUDENT**

For those of you who are new to TUUC, our congregation is helping to sponsor a student at Goucher College. Our agreement specifies that the student come from a country on the "banned" list. Our student, Parsa Sheikholeslami, is from Iran. He was at Goucher for the fall semester, but, due to health issues, had to take the spring semester off. He is returning for the summer due to visa requirements. He will be taking one class at Goucher and the rest at CCBC for the summer term. Two wonderful TUUC members have stepped forward to lend him vehicles so he can get back and forth to school. He will be living in the dorm on the Goucher Campus.

We have made a commitment for \$5000 per semester. This summer semester will not cost near as much as the regular school year. So we are hoping to raise \$1000 to help him through this summer. We will resume our regular \$5000 commitment in the fall. If you would like to make a donation of any amount to help Parsa out, please specify "Goucher Student" when you do so. #### **UUA GENERAL ASSEMBLY**



Every year in June, the Unitarian Universalist Association convenes a General

Assembly to pass resolutions and provide direction on use of UUA resources in matters of social action. There are numerous worship opportunities and workshops on various topics, including church administration, humanism, leadership development, religious exploration, and social justice.

This year, GA will be in Kansas City, Missouri from June 20 until 24. Registration opens on March 1. There is a cost for registration, which is higher if you attend in person. Participation online is possible for a lower fee. More information can be found at <a href="https://www.uua.org/ga">https://www.uua.org/ga</a>.

Registering early is recommended as the cost goes up closer to the event. If you would like attend in person, the UUA has blocked rooms at local hotels for discounted rates. However, these rooms tend to go quickly; so registering early will ensure housing.

TUUC has been allotted five delegates. Delegates vote in the general sessions on Actions of Immediate Witness, Congregational Study Issues, and Bylaws changes.


#### **GALLERY UNICORN**
