Welcoming and Belonging

Rev. Clare L. Petersberger

Since October is LGBTQ history month, and October 11 is National Coming Out Day, this seems a good time to ask, "What does it mean to be a welcoming congregation in 2019?" What does it mean to be a

sanctuary for our whole selves? What would it mean, in the words of Zr. Alex Kapitan, a lay community minister, "That in this space there was nothing about you that could make people reverse their welcome or reject you from the circle of belonging...?"



YOUTH RELIGIOUS EXPLORATION

Our three younger groups will start out upstairs in the service and then be sung down to join with friends new and old for their class or group. This is the last day to bring books for all ages to donate for the book drive being held by the 4th-6th class to combat illiteracy! Place books in a box near the door upstairs or downstairs at the greeter table.

This coming Sunday, October 13:

Kindergarten/First Grade Creating Home: Homes in Nature

In *Walden*, Thoreau sets out a life of deliberate living that includes learning. He chose nature as an instructor. This session introduces children to the idea of learning from nature as they observe nature and transfer the knowledge they gain to their own family homes and their shared faith home. In this session, participants personalize and then use nature journals after hearing a story about Henry David Thoreau.

2nd/3rd Grade Moral Tales: Forgiveness

This session includes a story about two friends who quarrel. One friend chooses forgiveness,

focusing on what is best about his friend, rather than on a hurt his friend caused him. This story introduces a metaphor: If we write our memories of the hurts another has caused us in sand, they will quickly be erased. If we carve the memory of a kindness another has shown us in stone, it will endure.

Art and storytelling activities help participants explore forgiveness of self and others in this session. Forgiveness will be added to the Moral Compass.

4th-6th Grade Harry and UU: Defense against the Dark Arts

Group members conclude the book drive by counting and boxing the books collected and start learning about the next horcrux hunger. Wizards and witches will strengthen work on defense against the dark arts by discussing fighting bogarts (facing fears) and then being sorted.

Our Whole Lives sexuality education

This class starts at 11 am in Room 6.

YRUU This group meets at 11:15 in Room 7. Discussion of the monthly theme of Belonging continues. Participants must return permission form and fee needed for the November 2 ropes/camping trip by October 13.

CLARE'S COLLOQUY

Our spiritual question for October is "What does it mean to be a people of belonging?"

To encourage our second and third grade students to explore this question, students are invited to sit in a circle. A welcome mat is placed in the center of the circle. The children are asked to imagine children who might visit them and how they would welcome them.

For example, how might you welcome a child who had just moved to the neighborhood? Perhaps you would invite them to share something about where they lived before. And if they mention a favorite playground you might share information about your favorite neighborhood playground! What if a child visited your class who has never been to a UU congregation before? How would you welcome them? Perhaps you would make sure to learn their name and introduce yourselves. Perhaps you would share what you've been doing in your class and ask what interests them.

The point of the exercise is that when we are in a new place and feel like an outsider, we need to be welcomed in a different way than when we know other people and know that we belong.

This exercise reminded me of one that adults engaged in at the Unitarian Universalist General Assembly in June. In a workshop on a Radically Inclusive Pathway to Membership, adults were asked how accessible their congregation's current Pathway to Membership is for the following people:

- Parent of small children
- Someone who uses a wheelchair

- A person who is hard of hearing
- Third shift/night shift workers
- Non-English speakers

We Unitarian Universalists tend to say, "We welcome everyone." I truly believe this is our intention. But what this exercise highlighted for participants is that creating a space of welcome and belonging takes intentionality. It may require a different worship schedule; renovations to make the building accessible; an upgraded sound system; creating a bilingual worship service, etc.

"We welcome everyone" is not the same thing as "We created this space, this program, etc. just for you."

This month we explore what it means to be a people of belonging. How might we, like the students, expand our circle of welcome? Who would we intentionally reach out to welcome? How might we thereby become a more inclusive community of belonging for others?

We wish to be bolder with our Welcome.

Our Unitarian Universalist Association informs us that Transgender Unitarian Universalists (UU) are still struggling to find community in UU congregations. Bisexual UUs suffer from invisibility while asexual, intersex, and polyamorous communities are wrestling with a progressive faith that does not privilege their truth. These and the many more social ills that plague our LGBTQ+ and TGQNB communities are calling us into a deeper commitment to ensure that our Unitarian Universalist congregations are living into the Welcome that we boldly proclaim.

Many years ago, Towson Unitarian Universalist Church became a Welcoming Congregation. That UUA program was designed to help UU churches to become more welcoming to sexual and gender

minorities. The Five Practices of Welcome Renewal is a program that was unveiled in 2015. The goal of the program is, "To honor your original pledge, it's essential that new people in the congregation (as well as people who were originally involved in the program) understand your congregation's commitment to this work and learn about the current needs and concerns of LGBTQ+ people."

The TUUC Program Council is sponsoring a team who will work with existing church committees and groups to embark on the steps to renew TUUC's status as a Welcoming Congregation. There are five practices of Welcome Renewal, covering such things as welcoming worship services, welcoming days of observance, and a welcoming congregational seminar. The focus is on LGBTQ+ / TGQNB communities and to bring visibility and affirmation after generations of invisibility and erasure. "All of who you are is sacred. All of who you are is welcome."

We are looking for people to join the team and will hold a planning meeting on a mutually agreeable date later in October or in November. Please contact Sue Royer if you are interested or have questions. LGBTQ+ / TGQNB persons are especially encouraged to join the team. Young adults are especially encouraged to join the team.

PROGRAM COUNCIL


The next Program Council meeting will be on **Wednesday, November 13 at 7:30 PM**. The spotlight topic will be Membership.

The TUUC Program Council is sponsoring a Common Read for 2019-2020. We've chosen the same book as the UUA:

An Indigenous Peoples' History of the United States by Roxanne Dunbar-Ortiz (Beacon Press, 2015), 314 pages

An Indigenous Peoples' History of the United States for Young People
by Roxanne Dunbar-Ortiz; adapted by Jean Mendoza and Debbie Reese (Beacon Press, 2019), 280 pages

In 2020, our nation will approach the 400th anniversary of the much-mythologized encounter at Plymouth between colonists and those native to the land, and our own UUA General Assembly 2020, in



Providence, RI, will speak to the truths that contradict the mythology. At the same time, movements in response to global and local environmental emergencies, many involving UUs, are increasingly recognizing the connection between indigenous rights and climate justice. This Common Read invites us to learn the story of trauma and resilience that is the Indigenous Peoples' History of the United States. [source: UUA, with adaptation].

If you are not familiar at all with this history, we suggest that you read the version for young people.

We are ordering the books through the church office and will make them available for sale on Sunday mornings. There will be multiple discussion opportunities in early 2020. Start reading now!

DENOMINATIONAL AFFAIRS

Following are the final two reports from General Assembly, 2019, by Board President Elect Sue Royer, and me. We both were virtual attendees.

Sue Royer: This was my first General Assembly, and I attended remotely, as an off-site delegate. It was a good introduction to what GA is all about.

Available to me as a remote attendee were worship, general sessions, including where voting would take place, the Ware lecture, and a few working sessions.

I attended the Future of Outreach and learned some key techniques that I will be sharing at TUUC. I also participated remotely when Robin DiAngelo, author of *White Fragility*, gave her talk.

The key message for me was that she is personally still making mistakes based on privilege and implicit bias. All of us of privilege need to be aware that, no matter how much reading and discussing, examining and working we do, we are still bound to make mistakes. If you have not read *White Fragility*, I highly recommend it.

Steve Finner: This was the third GA I attended electronically, and each year the web site is easier to navigate and events are easier to find. Since all the events I saw are still available on line, I have given the links for each.

The first event I saw was the Opening Ceremony <https://www.uua.org/ga/off-site/2019/worship/opening> which features a parade of most of the delegates carrying their church banners. I try to see how many people I recognize.

Thursday morning's Opening Worship was outstanding. <https://www.uua.org/ga/off-site/2019/worship/thursday>

I was especially moved by the homily, "A Love to Change The World", delivered by UUA President, Rev. Susan Frederick-Gray, the text of which is posted on the website, and a summary of which can be found in the most recent UU World, page 4. <https://www.uuworld.org/articles/president-fall-2019>

The "Service of The Living Tradition" an annual GA event, recognizes those ministers admitted to Preliminary or Final Fellowship, newly credentialed Directors of Religious Education, and Directors of Music, and remembers those minister who have passed in the last year. <https://www.uua.org/ga/off-site/2019/worship/sl>

The sermon, by the Rev. Linda Ramsden, was a poignant and personal testimony about the value of the Fund for The Living Tradition, and reaffirmed our values and commitment as Unitarian Universalists.

The annual GA Ware Lecture was given by Richard Blanco, a gay Cuban -born poet, was the fifth inaugural poet in the history of the U.S. selected for that honor by President Barack Obama. His address centered on the theme of GA, "The Power of We'. It was at times amusing , at other times challenging, and well worth a listen.

Another annual event at GA is the Sophia Fahs lecture. Sophia Blanche Lyon Fahs was an editor, author, teacher, and religious activist who led a revolution in Unitarian religious education. This year's lecture was

presented by Paula Cole Jones, a lifelong member of All Souls Unitarian Church in Washington D.C. and a member of the UUA Central Eastern regional staff. She spoke on “Building a Community of Communities” <https://www.uua.org/ga/off-site/2019/workshops/sophia-fahs-lecture>

Paula will be expanding on her thoughts presented in this lecture here at TUUC on Saturday, January 26. You will be hearing more about this in the weeks to come. And finally, I viewed the Sunday closing worship.

As always, it was exciting and inspiring. The GA choir was wonderful (and I look forward to attending GA in Providence next June and singing in the GA choir). The sermon by the Rev. Marta Valentin was challenging and I





On **Friday, November 1st, at 6:30**, ADORE will join with Available Light to present Ang Lee's *The Wedding Banquet*, a comedy about a man of Chinese heritage who is living happily with his boyfriend. But he has not come out to his parents, who are eager for him to find a Chinese wife. To please them, he agrees to a wedding, which will simultaneously please his parents and secretly help a friend desperate for a green card. What could go wrong?

On **Tuesday, December 3, at 7:00**, two members of UUJME (Unitarian Universalists for Justice in the Middle East) will be joining us to have a circle talk about Palestine/Israel and what UUJME is doing to promote a peaceful and just resolution of the Palestine-Israel conflict, affirming the equality, dignity, freedom and security of all peoples involved.

Thanks to those who attended our recent discussion on reparations. The short informational videos which preceded the discussion held some surprises for a white audience: the African American speakers were not focused on financial remuneration, as white commenters often are. Their primary concern is in uncovering our hidden history by acknowledging that race-based slavery was an economic institution that powered the American economy for centuries and that, in the wake of

emancipation, laws continued to ensure that African Americans would not be permitted to participate in civic or economic life as citizens with full rights and privileges.


