Listening For Your Word
Rev. Clare L. Petersberger

Our spiritual question for November is, "What does it mean to be a people of attention?" In many religious traditions, a spiritual practice to focus attention is "prayer." Unitarian Universalists have a pamphlet on prayer. It includes the theologian Reinhold Neibuhr's observation: "Prayer does not change things; prayer changes people, and people change things.... Prayer is not hearing voices, prayer is acquiring a voice." Today we explore different Unitarian Universalist understandings of prayer.

YOUTH RELIGIOUS EXPLORATION

Our three younger groups will start out upstairs in the service and then be sung down to join with friends new and old for their class or group. The story this Sunday is *Granddad's Prayer for the Earth,* by Douglas Wood.

Kindergarten/First Grade Creating Home: Hare's Gifts

This session explores how people co-create our community homes together. The central story is an African folktale of how Hare created the first village. Instead of the word "village," this session uses "community." In the story, Hyena builds a home that is lovely, but isolated. Hare builds a home that welcomes a community of friends to make their homes nearby. Hyena throws a party to show that he can afford to provide the best of everything for his guests. Hare throws a party that involves everyone in the community providing for one another. Like Hare's house-building party, our faith communities, at their best, are open and inviting places where we feel that we and our personal contributions are welcome. The appreciative responses of others foster our sense of belonging. We gain the fellowship of friends, and

encouragement to serve the community and express our sense of belonging to and caring about it by bringing forth our gifts. When we belong to a faith community, we have opportunities to experience and acknowledge the gifts of other members. In this session, games and other playful activities invite participants into the Creating Home community.

2nd/3rd Grade Moral Tales: Golden Rule

This session promotes the Golden Rule, "Do unto others as you would have them do unto you," and the suggestion from scripture to "Love thy neighbor as thyself." The central story, "The Good Samaritan" from Christian scripture, guides exploration of what it means to "love thy neighbor" and helps raise the idea that our "neighbors" include everyone in the world. The experience of helping and caring for others will be explored in the session through role plays and a cooperative game. The session also promotes two Unitarian Universalist Principles, the inherent worth and dignity of all people; and justice, equity and compassion. The words "Golden Rule" will be added to the Moral Compass poster.

4th-6th Grade Harry and UU:

This group raised \$105 for Paul's Place last Sunday with donations for jars of Friendship soup mix. They will do the activities that were postponed from last week (using the Sorting Hat and studying ancient runes) and discussing poverty in our community.

Our Whole Lives sexuality education (7th-9th)

This group continues to have great discussions about important topics dealing with sexuality, health, and values. They are looking forward to an overnight at TUUC on Nov. 8, which will include OWL sessions and time for fun.

YRUU This group meets at 11:15 in Room 7. Participants will start a discussion of Attention, the theme for this month.

CLARE'S COLLOQUY

Our spiritual question for November is: "What does it mean to be a people of attention?" As I've previously shared, one of the ways I am reminded to pay attention to time is through the app, "We Croak." It sends random reminders, up to five times a day, that we are mortal. At the end of October, my phone buzzed. The app had sent these words by the philosopher Eugene Thacker: "A new ignorance is on the horizon, an ignorance borne not of a lack of knowledge but of too much knowledge, too much data, too many theories, too little time."

This observation resonated with me as three different people had recently shared how they had become overwhelmed by the headlines and needed to take a break from watching so much news.

While in Hospice care, and facing their own mortality, people often report that they are no longer interested in the news---that it is for others to be concerned about and to do something about. They also report they no longer worry about flossing their teeth! What calls for their attention is gratitude: gratitude for the gift of life; gratitude for family and friends; gratitude for pain free days; gratitude for good memories.

So I was not surprised that one of the Soul Matters Sharing Circle practices for November lifts up Mary Oliver's poem, "Gratitude." https://thevalueofsparrows.com/2013/11/27/ poetry-gratitude-by-mary-oliver/ In it, Mary Oliver asks and answers eight questions. It appears that she is doing so in relation to one day spent in nature. But one could

ask the same questions about a year (one that might begin with Thanksgiving) or even a lifetime.

And one could ask these questions in terms of time spent at TUUC in November during the Available Light Movie Night, the Night and Day music concert, worship services, Youth Religious Exploration classes, the Green Sanctuary Drawdown program, THE TUUC Auction, and other programs.

Mary Oliver's eight questions are below. They call our attention away from information to wisdom. Perhaps they will inspire you to write a blessing for your Thanksgiving meal. Perhaps they will inspire you to write a blessing of gratitude for TUUC.

What did you notice?
What did you hear?
When did you admire?
What astonished you?
What would you like to see again?
What was most tender?
What was most wonderful?
What did you think was happening?

If you would like to e-mail me your responses to these questions (revclare@towsonuuc.org), I will seek to include them in the December 1 worship service on the one subject Mary Oliver discerned was worthy of her attention.



GOVERNANCE UPDATE: PHASE I OF BYLAWS CHANGES APPROVED

At the Congregational Meeting on October 27, approximately 42 members were present. All voted in favor of the proposed bylaws changes. Towson Unitarian Universalist Church has been operating under a new trial governance structure since July, 2018. The new structure includes an Administrative Team, which makes operational decisions, and a Program Council, which coordinates and promotes programs. These two entities replaced the Operations Team. The approved bylaws changes removed the Operations Team and references to it.

Thank you to the members of the Governance Task Force, the Board, Administrative Team, Program Council, and all members who attended the meeting and cast their vote.

Now we move into Phase II of bylaws changes. Other recommendations from Rev. David Pyle's report for improving our church governance will be discussed and considered. The Board is expanding the membership of the bylaws committee. If you are interested in serving on the bylaws committee, please speak with Karyn Marsh, Art Starr, or any Board member. Stay tuned for discussion opportunities between now and the next congregational meeting, which is scheduled for June 14, 2020 at 12 noon.

At this workshop, we're invited to light up our play circuits to learn and to be creative in new ways to understand ourselves and the ones we love. Even when we disagree, we can give from our generous hearts so that others can respond from their own hearts.

We'll have meditative exercises, small groups, useful handouts with clear concepts, and will grapple with verbalizing feelings and needs while not blaming. Even experienced NCVers can use our practice.

Our workshop facilitator will be Sarah Dammeyer, who weaves NVC and other restorative practices into everything she does, including parenting, doula support, and teaching. She likes to offer experiments in listening and power-sharing for parents, teachers, and community groups. She trained in the peacekeeping circle tradition with Kay Pranis and is grateful for the chance to keep circles for youth and families through Keybridge Foundation, RestorativeDC, and DC Peace team.

DENOMINATIONAL MINUTE

The first denominational minute, published in April, listed the various denominational bodies with which TUUC is affiliated. The last one mentioned was the Baltimore Cluster, an area body consisting of 7 congregations and one covenanting community.

The cluster became active around six years ago and according to TUUC's Tom Zeller got off to a good start and engaged in a number of activities and information sharing including two choral festivals, one held in Fallston and the other here at Towson. The cluster remained active for around four years and then became dormant.

On October 23, representatives from all seven congregations in the cluster met via video conference to discuss the possibility of resurrecting the cluster. The meeting was facilitated by Paula Cole Jones, our UUA staff liaison from the Central East Region, and a lifelong member of All Souls Unitarian in Washington D.C. Towson had four representatives at this meeting; Sue Royer, Tom Zeller, Wendell Finner, and Steve Finner. The other congregations in the cluster are First Unitarian Church in Baltimore, and the UU Congregations of Columbia, Harford County, Fallston, Cedarhurst in Finksburg, and Channing Memorial in Ellicott City. In sum, these congregations number 1,156 adult members, and approximately 350 children and youth in their RE programs.

As a way of illustrating the ways in which clusters can be organized, and what sort of activities they engage in, Paula described the functioning of the Del Marva cluster. Similar to Baltimore, there are eight congregations in the cluster ranging from Wilmington in the

north, which is the largest, to Salisbury in the south (https://www.uua.org/central-east/clusters-affiliate-groups/clusters/delmarva-cluster). The cluster meets approximately every six weeks alternating between a face-to-face meeting and a virtual meeting. The cluster has a dues structure and a budget, and makes small grants available to member congregations.

The cluster held a conference at the beginning of October and presented a number of workshops including fundraising, lay led worship, and membership development.

Two activities of interest to the UUA is using clusters to facilitate sustainability and growth and to network our youth groups, so they won't feel isolated. She suggested this is something the Baltimore cluster might want to explore. Paula also shared that some clusters have been presenting programs on anti-racism and the 8th principle.

The Philadelphia cluster holds an Annual Jubilee at which there is anti-racism training. There will be an anti-racism training presented at the UU Church of Columbia on May 29-30, 2020, details of which will be forthcoming.

Those present at this first meeting of the Baltimore Cluster expressed interest in all the activities that Paula described. There was also interest in holding a spirituality retreat and assisting congregations in their financial audit. We may be inviting a representative of the Delmarva Cluster to a future meeting to describe the finance, budget and dues structure of the cluster.

The next meeting of the cluster will be a video conference in early December. If you are interested in participating, please contact Steve Finner at finnerstephen@gmail.com

WELCOME RENEWAL – CALL TO JOIN OUR TEAM!

We wish to be bolder with our Welcome.

Our Unitarian Universalist Association informs us that Transgender Unitarian Universalists (UUs) are still struggling to find community in UU congregations. Bisexual UUs suffer from invisibility while asexual, intersex, and polyamorous communities are wrestling with a progressive faith that does not privilege their truth. These and the many more social ills that plague our LGBTQ+ and TGQNB communities are calling us into a deeper commitment to ensure that our Unitarian Universalist congregations are living into the Welcome that we boldly proclaim.

Many years ago, Towson Unitarian
Universalist Church become a Welcoming
Congregation. That UUA program was
designed to help UU churches to become
more welcoming to sexual and gender
minorities. The Five Practices of Welcome
Renewal is a program that was unveiled
in2015. The goal of the program is, "To
honor your original pledge, it's essential that
new people in the congregation (as well as
people who were originally involved in the
program) understand your congregation's
commitment to this work and learn about the
current needs and concerns of LGBTQ+
people."

The TUUC Program Council is sponsoring a team who will work with existing church committees and groups to embark on the steps to renew TUUC's status as a Welcoming Congregation. There are five practices of Welcome Renewal, covering such things as welcoming worship services, welcoming days of observance, and a welcoming congregational seminar. The focus is on LGBTQ+ / TGQNB communities and to bring visibility and affirmation after generations of invisibility and erasure. "All of who you are is sacred. All of who you are is welcome."

We are looking for people to join the team and will hold a planning meeting on a mutually agreeable date later in October or in November. Please contact Sue Royer if you are interested or have questions. LGBTQ+/TGQNB persons are especially encouraged to join the team. Young adults are especially encouraged to join the team.


ADDITIONAL FLATWARE FOR TUUC KITCHEN



In 2020, our nation will approach the 400th anniversary of the much-mythologized encounter at Plymouth between colonists and those native to the land, and our own UUA General Assembly 2020, in Providence, RI, will speak to the truths that contradict the mythology. At the same time, movements in response to global and local environmental emergencies, many involving UUs, are increasingly recognizing the connection between indigenous rights and climate justice. This Common Read invites us to learn the story of trauma and resilience that is the Indigenous Peoples' History of the United States. [source: UUA, with adaptation]. 


