How to Grow the Good In Your Brain
Rev. Clare L. Petersberger
In the 19th century, Ralph Waldo Emerson
wrote: <u>That which dominates our</u>
imaginations and our thoughts will determine
our lives, and our character. Therefore, it
behooves us to be careful what we worship,

for what we are worshipping, we are becoming." In the 21st century, research on experience-dependent neuroplasticity is confirming Emerson's observation that our experiences and "what dominates our imaginations and our thoughts will determine our lives." What implications does this have for our spiritual lives?

YOUTH RELIGIOUS EXPLORATION

Our three younger groups will start out upstairs in the service and then be sung down to join with friends new and old for their class or group.

Kindergarten/First Grade Creating Home: Our Ancestral Home

In addition to the particular places where we live and our immediate families, many of us also call home the places from which our ancestors came. Memories and stories associated with grandparents, aunts, uncles, and great-grandparents can make us feel as if the places they lived are also, in a way, our homes. Being able to trace our ancestry to a particular place can make us feel anchored and secure. It can help us feel connected to something larger and greater than ourselves.

Telling stories about our ancestors, those who preceded us, is a way to keep their memory alive. It is a way to acknowledge and be thankful for the love and legacies they left behind. Children will learn about a few our Unitarian and Universalist ancestors through memory boxes.

2nd/3rd Grade Moral Tales: Generosity

This session introduces generosity as an important spiritual discipline and religious act that is a central component of justice and goodness. It is based on the notion that generosity is a way of life that reaps benefit for both giver and receiver.

As Unitarian Universalists, we engage in generosity and other acts of goodness, not for a promise in a future life, but in order to create and reap the rewards of a better world for ourselves and others in the here and now. This session assumes that generosity stems from an attitude of gratitude and a feeling of abundance, both of which grow with giving. It reflects the conviction that a deepening in compassion that leads to action on behalf of others is an integral part of spiritual maturation.

In the United States, children are immersed in a culture that promotes accumulation and materialism. This session counteracts that lifestyle with an opportunity to experience the joy of giving. This class will make play dough to give to younger children.

4th-6th Grade Harry and UU: Single Potion

This class will start to address the horcrux of child slavery. In the next few weeks, they will meet with a member of Fair Trade team, watch a video to learn about child labor in the chocolate industry, and learn ways to raise awareness in our congregation and encourage noncompliant companies to change. The potion activity introduces the question of when individuals and groups mix to form a group and when they do not.

Our Whole Lives Sexuality Education (7th-9th)

This group continues to have great discussions about important topics dealing with sexuality, health, and values. They are looking forward to an overnight at TUUC this weekend, which will include OWL sessions and time for fun.

YRUU This group meets at 11:15 in Room 7. Andrew Hager visits the group to get feedback on the current format of Sunday morning experience at TUUC.

Can you imagine an interaction with another person that creates self-care for you *and* connection with the other person? Honesty *and* kindness? Nonviolent Communication (NVC) is all about how to do that.

At this workshop, we're invited to light up our play circuits to learn and to be creative in new ways to understand ourselves and the ones we love. Even when we disagree, we can give from our generous hearts so that others can respond from their own hearts.

We'll have meditative exercises, small groups, useful handouts with clear concepts, and will grapple with verbalizing feelings and needs

while not blaming. Even experienced NCVers can use our practice.

Our workshop facilitator will be Sarah Dammeyer, who weaves NVC and other restorative practices into everything she does, including parenting, doula support, and teaching. She likes to offer experiments in listening and power-sharing for parents, teachers, and community groups. She trained in the peacekeeping circle tradition with Kay Pranis and is grateful for the chance to keep circles for youth and families through Keybridge Foundation, RestorativeDC, and DC Peace team.

GOVERNANCE UPDATE: PHASE I OF BYLAWS CHANGES APPROVED



At the Congregational Meeting on October 27, approximately 42 members were present. All voted in favor of the proposed bylaws changes.

Towson Unitarian Universalist Church has been operating under a new trial governance structure since July, 2018. The new structure includes an Administrative Team, which makes operational decisions, and a Program Council, which coordinates and promotes programs. These two entities replaced the Operations Team. The approved bylaws changes removed the Operations Team and references to it.

Thank you to the members of the Governance Task Force, the Board, Administrative Team, Program Council, and all members who attended the meeting and cast their vote.

Now we move into Phase II of bylaws changes. Other recommendations from Rev. David Pyle's report for improving our church governance will be discussed and considered. The Board is expanding the membership of the bylaws committee. If you are interested in serving on the bylaws committee, please speak with Karyn Marsh, Art Starr, or any Board member. Stay tuned for discussion opportunities between now and the next congregational meeting, which is scheduled for June 14, 2020 at 12 noon.

CLARE'S COLLOQUY

Our spiritual question for November is:
"What does it mean to be a people of attention?" As I've previously shared, one of the ways I am reminded to pay attention to time is through the app, "We Croak." It sends random reminders, up to five times a day, that we are mortal. At the end of October, my phone buzzed. The app had sent these words by the philosopher Eugene Thacker:
"A new ignorance is on the horizon, an ignorance borne not of a lack of knowledge but of too much knowledge, too much data, too many theories, too little time."

This observation resonated with me as three different people had recently shared how they had become overwhelmed by the headlines and needed to take a break from watching so much news.

While in Hospice care, and facing their own mortality, people often report that they are no longer interested in the news---that it is for others to be concerned about and to do something about. They also report they no longer worry about flossing their teeth! What calls for their attention is gratitude: gratitude for the gift of life; gratitude for family and friends; gratitude for pain free days; gratitude for good memories.

So I was not surprised that one of the Soul Matters Sharing Circle practices for November lifts up Mary Oliver's poem, "Gratitude." https://

thevalueofsparrows.com/2013/11/27/poetry -gratitude-by-mary-oliver/

In it, Mary Oliver asks and answers eight questions. It appears that she is doing so in relation to one day spent in nature. But one could ask the same questions about a year (one that might begin with Thanksgiving) or even a lifetime.

And one could ask these questions in terms of time spent at TUUC in November during the Available Light Movie Night, the Night and Day music concert, worship services, Youth Religious Exploration classes, the Green Sanctuary Drawdown program, THE TUUC Auction, and other programs.

Mary Oliver's eight questions are below. They call our attention away from information to wisdom. Perhaps they will inspire you to write a blessing for your Thanksgiving meal. Perhaps they will inspire you to write a blessing of gratitude for TUUC.

What did you notice?
What did you hear?
When did you admire?
What astonished you?
What would you like to see again?
What was most tender?
What was most wonderful?
What did you think was happening?

DENOMINATIONAL MINUTE

At the end of last month, I attended the annual New York State Universalist Convention, which was held at the First Universalist Society in Rochester. A bit of history is in order.

In the early 1800's, Universalism started to grow significantly. By the middle of the 19th century, it was the sixth largest religious denomination in the country and the fastest growing one.

While Unitarianism was gaining adherents among the more educated segments of the population, Universalism was primarily attracting farmers and blue-collar families. Their ministers were often "self-declared" with little no formal training or education. To deal with this, Universalist churches in New York and Northern New England formed statewide denominational bodies, called "Conventions" for the purposes of training and ordaining ministers and supplying them to the new growing local congregations.

The New York Convention (nyscu.org) was established in 1825, and the Vermont - Quebec Convention in 1833.

Following confederation of the Unitarians and Universalists in 1961, most of these state organizations disappeared. However, the New York body continues as a repository of historical materials and because of a significant endowment, a result of individual bequests and the assets of Universalist churches no longer in existence, makes grants for various purposes to Unitarian Universalist congregations in New York.

There is a similar body in Vermont, which does the same, but on a much smaller level.

The highlights of this meeting, aside from the business meeting of the Convention, were an address by UUA President Reverend Susan Frederick-Gray, and workshops on GLBTQ issues and one on the Convention's archives.

The inspired keynote address focused on the current activities and state of the UUA.

I have posted a short clip on the TUUC Facebook page. Rev. Susan described the "UU The Vote 2020" a project aimed at getting out the vote in 2020, especially among those voters who are apt to be marginalized or at risk of voter suppression. The UUA is devoting considerable resources to this project including a full time organizer. For more information go to https://www.uua.org/liberty/electionreform.

Rev. Frederick-Gray also shared that registration for GA 2020 in Providence RI (June 24-28) opens in November, and for the first time, the registration fee may be paid in installments, with an initial payment of \$50 and the final payment due by February 29. Early bird registration through March 15 is \$400. https://www.uua.org/ga/registration

WELCOME RENEWAL – CALL TO JOIN OUR TEAM!

We wish to be bolder with our Welcome. Our Unitarian Universalist Association

informs us that Transgender Unitarian
Universalists (UUs) are still struggling to find
community in UU congregations. Bisexual
UUs suffer from invisibility while asexual,
intersex, and polyamorous communities are
wrestling with a progressive faith that does
not privilege their truth. These and the many
more social ills that plague our LGBTQ+ and

TGQNB communities are calling us into a deeper commitment to ensure that our Unitarian Universalist congregations are living into the Welcome that we boldly proclaim.

Many years ago, Towson Unitarian
Universalist Church become a Welcoming
Congregation. That UUA program was
designed to help UU churches to become
more welcoming to sexual and gender
minorities. The Five Practices of Welcome
Renewal is a program that was unveiled
in2015. The goal of the program is, "To
honor your original pledge, it's essential that
new people in the congregation (as well as
people who were originally involved in the
program) understand your congregation's
commitment to this work and learn about the
current needs and concerns of LGBTQ+
people."

The TUUC Program Council is sponsoring a team who will work with existing church committees and groups to embark on the steps to renew TUUC's status as a Welcoming Congregation. There are five practices of Welcome Renewal, covering such things as welcoming worship services, welcoming days of observance, and a welcoming congregational seminar. The focus is on LGBTQ+ / TGQNB communities and to bring visibility and affirmation after generations of invisibility and erasure. "All of who you are is sacred. All of who you are is welcome."

We are looking for people to join the team and will hold a planning meeting on a mutually agreeable date later in October or in November. Please contact Sue Royer if you are interested or have questions. LGBTQ+/TGQNB persons are especially encouraged to join the team. Young adults are especially encouraged to join the team.

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

If you are not familiar at all with this history, we suggest that you read the version for young people.

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




