What will be your legacy?

The turning of the seasons always demands our attention, and autumn in particular seems to invite reflection not only upon the past year, but also mortality, perhaps because we know we will all be ancestors someday in the ever turning wheel of life. Yom Kippur, Halloween, Thanksgiving Day, and since 1999,

Transgender Day of Remembrance on November 20 are just a few examples of cultural attention to death and remembrance at this time of year. In today's service, seminarian and Lay Worship Associate Karyn Marsh will explore the question of collective and individual legacy while leading a ritual of remembrance of our physical and spiritual ancestors and their legacies. Please feel free to bring items to commemorate your loved ones.

Kindergarten/First Grade Creating Home: Bless This Meal

Food is important to us. It is life sustaining at the most basic level. Yet we have not necessarily kept it basic. Think of the elaborate preparation that goes into special or holiday meals. Look at the ritualization of eating found in many cultures — from Shabbat meals and Passover Seders to Thanksgiving dinners and Japanese tea ceremonies, from religious fasting and breaking a fast together, to church potlucks. The significance of sharing a meal is universal.

Often at such a meal, a grace is said. A grace provides an opportunity to acknowledge the value of the food itself, and perhaps the company or the occasion for the meal, lifting the experience from the gastronomical to the spiritual. Children in this class will learn about what makes a meal special through the story. They will be invited to make table tents with a blessing they choose that they can take home and use with their family on Thanksgiving dinner or every night.

2nd/3rd Grade Moral Tales: Nonviolence

Reflecting the sixth Unitarian Universalist Principle, which promotes "the goal of world community with peace, liberty, and justice for all," this session draws on the Buddhist and Hindu notion of non-harm, or ahimsa. It is written, in the Buddhist *Digha Nikaya*, "Abandoning the taking of life, the ascetic Gautama dwells refraining from taking life, without stick or sword." This session also draws on Christian scripture: "Put your sword back into its place; for all those who take the sword will perish by the sword." (Matthew 26:52) The word "Non-violence" will be added to the Moral Compass poster. The group will make "what would a UU do" bracelets to wear as a reminder of what they learned.

4th-6th Grade Harry and UU: Defense against the Dark Arts

This group will be writing a letter to a chocolate manufacturer to urge them to employ adults, not children, and maintain fair trade practices. Please stop by the table in the foyer to learn about this and sign their petition. Thank you for helping our children learn about the power of advocacy.

Our Whole Lives sexuality education (7th-9th)

This group will be discussing sexuality and social media. They will also meet with Tracy at the end of class to go over their part in December 22 service.

YRUU This group meets at 11:15 in Room 7. This group will start on the script of The Solstice Badger, which they will be helping to present on December 22.

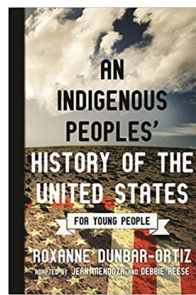

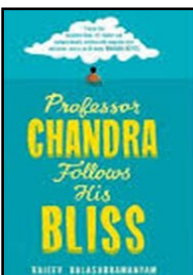

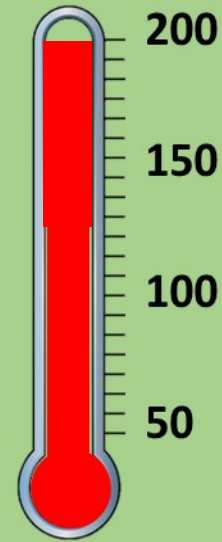
