They took in the image in silence. Then they laughed and hugged. And Stacy remembers thinking, "What were we even arguing about?" When have you had a similar experience? What did you learn about the relationship between awe and altruism?

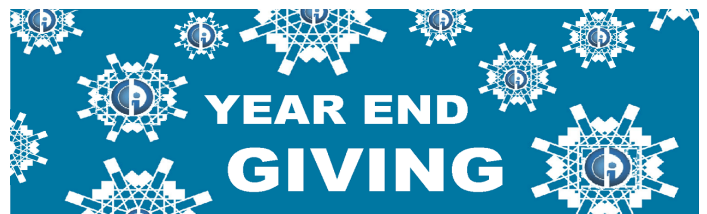

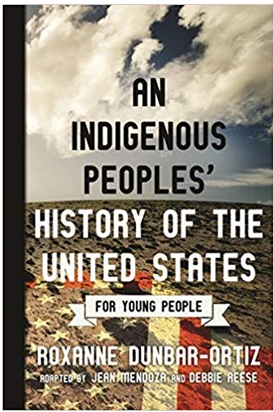
PLEDGE REMINDER

CLARE'S COLLOQUY

An article in the most recent *The Christian Century* retold a story about Toni Morrison. Evidently, when she was working with a colleague at Princeton, he shared with her that he would like to write something about the religious dimensions of her work because she drew upon different religious traditions in her novels. She replied, "Yes, you're right, I do draw on those sources. But you left out the other part of the religion in my work." He gave her a puzzled look. She replied, "The strange stuff." For Toni Morrison, the strange stuff was part of the everyday---especially for vulnerable, marginalized, and oppressed people.

There is a great deal of "strange stuff" in the stories of different religious traditions this month: a great feast held in midwinter by farmers to woo back the sun; oil to rededicate the Jewish temple that was supposed to burn for only one night that burned for eight days; angels in the gospel of Luke proclaiming the birth of a savior to shepherds watching their flocks by night. The strange stuff did not happen outside of the everyday, but rather within it, at least for the hungry farmers hoping for sunlight and warmth, the underdog Jewish Maccabees who had won back the Temple, and the shepherds watching their sheep with no thought of the incarnation of the holy in a human baby.

This "strange stuff" reminds me how often we associate awe with positive experiences (as in the song 'Everything Is Awesome,' in the Legos movie.)

The word "awful," which we often associate with negative experiences of something bad or objectionable, once meant "to be filled with awe" ---with respect, and with reverence.

So the farmers must have been filled with awe when the sun shone just a bit longer each day after winter solstice. The Jewish people must have been filled with awe hearing the story of the oil that burned for eight days. And early Christians must have been filled with awe hearing the story of the heavenly host promising salvation and peace to the shepherds.

What about us, today? What does it mean to be a people of awe? In early December, I met with colleagues for a retreat. We spent 45 minutes with a poem by Lucy Shaw about the annunciation: <http://lineageofexpectation.blogspot.com/2011/11/for-who-can-endure-day-of-his-coming.html> Then we asked ourselves and shared with one another where we are in the poem, about what we need to "Fear Not"; and what is awakening in us.

In our responses, coming out of the midst of our every day lives, was Toni Morrison's "strange stuff:" vulnerability and transcendence, marginalization and inclusion, despair and hope.

Wherever you find yourself in the season, in the stories of the season, or in the poem, as people of awe, may you be touched by experiences "of that transcending mystery and wonder which moves us to a renewal of the spirit and an openness to the forces which create and uphold life." Happy holidays!

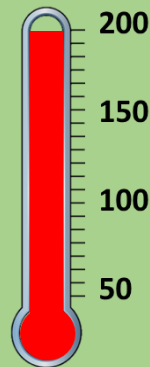

Mentoring Male Teens in the Hood is a program for young men ages 8 to 18, most live in Baltimore City. The program provides weekly tutoring, monthly speakers and guidance and inspiration for educational and career choices. Mentoring Male Teens offers field trips, both day trips and an annual overnight trip. The program was established in 1996, and the dedicated director and volunteers are committed to exposing and teaching the Kings that they are cared for and believed in. The program became one of TUUC's community partners in 2016. Since then, six to nine volunteers from TUUC execute a lesson every first Saturday of the month, tutoring the young men from 9 am - 12:30 pm in their meeting space at New Shiloh Baptist Church.
