
### **PLEDGE REMINDER**

### **CLARE'S COLLOQUY**

An article in the most recent The Christian Century retold a story about Toni Morrison. Evidently, when she was working with a colleague at Princeton, he shared with her that he would like to write something about the religious dimensions of her work because she drew upon different religious traditions in her novels. She replied, "Yes, you're right, I do draw on those sources. But you left out the other part of the religion in my work." He gave her a puzzled look. She replied, "The strange stuff." For Toni Morrison, the strange stuff was part of the everyday---especially for vulnerable, marginalized, and oppressed people.

There is a great deal of "strange stuff" in the stories of different religious traditions this month: a great feast held in midwinter by farmers to woo back the sun; oil to rededicate the Jewish temple that was supposed to burn for only one night that burned for eight days; angels in the gospel of Luke proclaiming the birth of a savior to shepherds watching their flocks by night. The strange stuff did not happen outside of the everyday, but rather within it, at least for the hungry farmers hoping for sunlight and warmth, the underdog Jewish Maccabees who had won back the Temple, and the shepherds watching their sheep with no thought of the incarnation of the holy in a human baby.

This "strange stuff" reminds me how often we associate awe with positive experiences (as in the song 'Everything Is Awesome,' in the Legos movie.)

The word "awful," which we often associate with negative experiences of something bad or objectionable, once meant "to be filled with awe" ---with respect, and with reverence.

So the farmers must have been filled with awe when the sun shone just a bit longer each day after winter solstice. The Jewish people must have been filled with awe hearing the story of the oil that burned for eight days. And early Christians must have been filled with awe hearing the story of the heavenly host promising salvation and peace to the shepherds.

What about us, today? What does it mean to be a people of awe? In early December, I met with colleagues for a retreat. We spent 45 minutes with a poem by Lucy Shaw about the annunciation: <a href="http://lineageofexpectation.blogspot.com/2011/11/for-who-can-endure-day-of-his-coming.html">http://lineageofexpectation.blogspot.com/2011/11/for-who-can-endure-day-of-his-coming.html</a> Then we asked ourselves and shared with one another where we are in the poem, about what we need to "Fear Not"; and what is awakening in us.

In our responses, coming out of the midst of our every day lives, was Toni Morrison's "strange stuff:" vulnerability and transcendence, marginalization and inclusion, despair and hope.

Wherever you find yourself in the season, in the stories of the season, or in the poem, as people of awe, may you be touched by experiences "of that transcending mystery and wonder which moves us to a renewal of the spirit and an openness to the forces which create and uphold life." Happy holidays!

### **DENOMINATIONAL MINUTE**

The Greater Baltimore Cluster of Unitarian Universalist Congregation held its second video conference December 4. Five of the eight cluster congregations were in attendance. Also present were the chair and vice-chair of the Delmarva Cluster, which like Baltimore, has eight congregations. They shared with us the history of the Cluster and described its current activities. The Cluster was established in 2009 and was attended by 22 UU's representing the eight congregations. A mission statement was created the following year and a budget and dues were established. Each congregation pays \$200 yearly and the resulting \$1600 is sufficient to cover the cluster's administrative expenses such as conducting the annual meetings. The Cluster also received a Chalice Lighters start up grant of \$20000.

The Delmarva Cluster meets every six weeks alternating between Zoom and in person. When they meet in person, some members meet for dinner. This has helped them to deepen relationships through the years. They hold an annual gathering providing workshops to build leadership capacity. The topics are selected on the basis of a survey of the eight congregations. Discussion followed their presentation and it was agreed for the two clusters to keep in touch and invite representatives of each to meetings of either cluster.

Following this presentation, the cluster discussed possible activities for an initial meeting. It was decided to hold the first face to face meeting of the cluster February 29, 2020 at the First Unitarian Church of Baltimore. The focus of the meeting will be a workshop on "Building a Community of

Communities", which will be presented by Central East Region staff member Paula Cole Jones, who is also a member of All Souls, Unitarian in Washington DC. Details will be forthcoming shortly.

Following lunch and the workshop, there will be a business meeting to start the discussion of what the next steps of the cluster should be with respect to governance, budget, meetings, and programming.

In sharing news of activities at some of the congregations that others might be interested in attending, it was decided to distribute a semi-monthly list of such activities through the cluster email list.

The next video conference meeting of the cluster is on January 7, 2020 at 7:30 PM

### **GALLERY UNICORN TUUC MEMBERS' SHOW**



# THE EVENING BOOK GROUP WEDNESDAY, JANUARY 8, 7:30 PM

An Indigenous Peoples' History of the United States by Roxanne Dunbar-Ortiz (non-fiction, 2014, 296 pages) The UUA's Common Read 2015 Recipient of the American Book Award In this first history of the United States told from the perspective of indigenous peoples, Dunbar-Ortiz adroitly challenges the founding myth of the United States and shows how policy against the Indigenous peoples was colonialist and designed to seize the territories of the original inhabitants, displacing or eliminating them. Spanning more than four hundred years, this classic bottom-up peoples' history radically reframes US history and explodes the silences that have haunted our national narrative.

\*Please note that the adult version of the book is 296 pages. The actual text of the book is 239 pages followed by 60 pages of acknowledgements, notes, works cited and an index.
