January 19, 2020, 9:30 and 11:15 AM Rev. Clare L. Petersberger: Family Planning: A Special and Urgent Concern

In 1966, Planned Parenthood Federation Of America presented The Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. with the Margaret Sanger Award for his courageous position, in the 1950's, in support of contraception. His position was unusual for Southern preachers of his time. He gave his acceptance speech the title of today's worship service. What might he say about threats to reproductive justice today? And, more importantly, what are we, as a people of integrity, preparing to do about this special and urgent concern?

January 26, 2020, 9:30 and 11:15 AM Stephen Finner: What, Me Worship?

I am a newcomer to TUUC, having joined this past August. This is my sixth UU congregation, in the 45 years I have been a Unitarian or Universalist. UU worship, like my theology, has changed over these many years. What is worship? How does it inform our faith? How does it impact our view of life? You may find my answers interesting and worthwhile. Or your response may be negative and lead you to consider my excommunication. I do promise that you won't be bored. So let the journey begin!

RELIGIOUS EXPLORATION

Our three younger groups will start out upstairs in the service and then be sung down to join with friends new and old for their class or group.

Kindergarten/First Grade Creating Home: **Comings and Goings**

In this session, the group explores how it feels to leave our family home and be welcomed back. We will also observe how the family systems within our family home change when we leave and return, and what does not change, whether we are at home or away. We will identify the constant in our family home, love.

The central story for this session is "The Lost Son," an adaptation of a parable from Christian scripture. Sometimes known as the Prodigal Son, this story tells of a father's love when one son comes home. A parable may teach many lessons as it is read over and over. This session focuses on the feelings and actions of the younger son and the father in the story. How does it feel to be trusted when you leave home? How does it feel to be welcomed home? How does it feel in a family when you know you are loved?

2nd/3rd Grade Moral Tales: Courage

This session introduces and encourages the virtue of courage, and defines it as the ability to stand up for what we believe is right despite our fears. It also relates to the sixth Unitarian Universalist Principle — the goal of world community with peace, liberty and justice for all — as it calls the children to find the courage to work toward this goal. An African folk tale introduces the children to a young woman who finds the courage to stand up to a hungry lion to save her cousin. The children will then be guided to remember times when they have found the courage to do something risky. Through a kinesthetic game the children will be introduced to assertiveness techniques to feel more empowered to express themselves when conscience calls.

4th-6th Grade Harry and UU: Fighting Animal Cruelty

This class will start to discuss the horcrux of animal cruelty and also discuss and make art


depicting their Patronus. In the world of Harry Potter, a Patronus is a guardian spirit that often takes animal form.

Our Whole Lives sexuality education (7th-9th) Gender Expression

This group continues to have great discussions about dealing with sexuality, health, and values. The topic this Sunday is gender orientation. This group meets at 11 am in Room 6.

YRUU Integrity

This group meets at 11:15 in Room 7. They continue planning the worship service that they present in February. The discussion theme for this month is Integrity.

GALLERY UNICORN




ADORE

On Wednesday, January 22, the ADORE group will meet to discuss our TUUC "common read," *An Indigenous Peoples' History of the United States for Young People*, by Roxanne

On **Friday, February 7**, you are invited to join ADORE and Available Light for a screening of *Us*, the 2019 horror film written and directed by Jordan Peele, the director of *Get Out*. A vacationing middle-class Black family finds themselves

under siege by an eerie group of home invaders who appear to be their doppelgängers. The film raises questions about our nation's history of genocide, about class inequality, and about the failure of good intentions to create change. LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

The 2020 Maryland General Assembly session has begun! TUUC partners with the UU Legislative Ministry of Maryland, which

will focus this year on legislative activity in the areas of climate change and the environment, economic justice, criminal justice, medically-assisted end of life, gun violence, healthcare, and immigration. You can get more information about current UULM legislation and sign up for email updates at http://www.uulmmd.org.

One upcoming action item is the vote to override the governor's veto of the Maryland DREAM Act expansion in order to remove restrictions on in-state tuition for some immigrant students at state colleges and universities. This vote is scheduled for January 21, 2020 in the House and January 22 in the Senate. Concerned voters should contact their senator and delegates to express their position on this override. You can determine who represents you by inputting your address at https://maryland.maps.arcgis.com/apps/webappviewer/index.html? id=177afa87a67746a4ac5496b2d0897fb7.

Override votes are also expected early in the session on legislation which would transfer handgun permit reviews away from a board appointed by the governor, and prohibit employers from asking about criminal records in initial job applications.

INVITATION TO 5-SESSION DRAWDOWN WORKSHOP

The 2017 book "Drawdown" talks about the 100 most effective solutions to combat carbon emissions to help curb global warming. All of the suggested solutions are currently available and have been vetted by scientists in those respective fields. The premise is that if we employ these techniques sufficiently, we can not only limit global warming, but can actually drawdown carbon from the atmosphere. It seems like a

ray of hope and a way to make a difference individually and collectively.

The Green Sanctuary Committee of the Towson Unitarian Universalist Chuurch is hosting The Pachamama Alliance's Reversing Global Warming 5-session workshop, entitled "Drawdown Solutions: Getting Into Action" which will begin on Monday January 27th from 7 to about 9:30 pm. It is free and will be held in Room 1 on the lower level. The sessions will be held on the following dates: January 27, February 10, February 24, March 9 and April 6. The last session will include a potluck.

If you are interested in participating in this 5-part "Drawdown Solutions: Getting into Action" please email us at this address: greensanctuary@towsonuuc.org a nd we will reserve you a spot. The workshop is free, but limited to approximately 20 people, so please reserve your spot right away, first come, first served.

This is a 5-part series that "supports you in finding your unique contribution to reversing global warming." The workshops will be led by Bobbie Miyasaki and Donna Eden, and will include videos of Paul Hawken and others, small and large group activities, handouts, and homework.

We will begin by looking at the "100 Solutions for Reversing Global Warming", familiarizing ourselves more fully with them and each participant will selecting one for a plan of action. From there, we will discuss the 4 Levels of Action: Individual/Family & Friends; Community/Schools/Workplaces/ Municipal Gov't; Structural/Systemic; and Policy/Legislation. In the 3rd session, we will investigate local organizations already

working on our chosen solutions. In the 4th session we will come up with our own concrete Action Plan to get involved with one's solution of interest, either individually or with a group. At the last meeting we will discuss our progress and accomplishments in achieving our plan of action to reverse global warming.






