The word "resilience" comes from Latin and has to do with going back to the beginning of the heart of something. Resiliency has to do with moving through life's changes. Resilience is not passive but active. Today we launch our annual stewardship campaign. Through music, story, and reflections we shall lift up returning to the heart of TUUC. What is that core? What does it require of us? How do we help one another to move with

and through change? How do we help one another to develop spiritual resiliency?

FEBRUARY 9, 2020 9:30 AND 11:15 AM How Happy We Have Been **Rev. Clare L. Petersberger**

In a poem about what she learned after fifty years of marriage, Linda Pastan confessed that she married her husband for all the wrong reasons. She muses that he did the same. In fact, she says, "How wrong we both were about each other." And yet, she concludes, "how happy we have been." Today we reflect on resiliency in long relationships that weather stress, heartbreak, hardship and change.

RELIGIOUS EXPLORATION

Our three younger groups will start out upstairs in the service and then be sung down to join with friends new and old for their class or group.

Kindergarten/First Grade Creating Home: Memories of Home

There is an obvious meaning of the title, "Memories of Home," for the final session in

Creating Home. Yet, the title also raises the image of times when we change our physical home and must reestablish home in a new place. Sometimes a relocation of home includes a change of faith home. Activities in this session recap some of the themes explored in other sessions, while helping children identify what connects the old and new. Memories of both family home and faith home can be contained in physical objects, relationships, and rituals. A certain piece of furniture will travel to a new home and bring memories. Family relationships usually transfer to a new home. Rituals such as graces, Sunday night pizza, or bedtime routines can also carry over to a new home.

2nd/3rd Grade Moral Tales: Working Together

While Unitarian Universalists value individual action, we also know that together we are stronger than the sum of our individual parts. Cooperation is a necessary skill for solving problems peacefully and equitably, and is a part of accepting and supporting one another. The value of cooperation is integrated within the Unitarian Universalist Principles, particularly the principles of the inherent worth and dignity of every person, acceptance of one another and encouragement of spiritual growth, the goal of world community, and respect for the interdependent web of all existence. In this session the children will hear and act out an Aesop's fable that uses a bundle of sticks to demonstrate the practical and spiritual strength gained by sticking together. They will also engage in a problem-solving role play, "What Would UU Do?" in which they seek cooperative solutions to dilemmas that they might encounter in their own young lives. Finally, there is a simple art activity in which they each make a bundle of sticks to

take home. Each stick in the bundle represents a child in the group, and each child's strengths will be honored as part of the whole, as in the story.

4th-6th Grade Harry and UU: Fighting Animal Cruelty

This class will be learning about groups that fight animal cruelty and make items to donate to a local group to support their efforts.

Our Whole Lives sexuality education (7th-9th)

This group continues to have great discussions about dealing with sexuality, health, and values. This group meets at 11 am in Room 6.

YRUU Integrity

This group meets at 11:15 in Room 7. They continue planning the worship service that they present in February. The discussion theme for this month is Integrity.

CLARE'S COLLOQUY

Our spiritual question for February is, "What does it mean to be a people of resilience?"

Resilience was not one of Aristotle's twelve virtues.

The word "resilience" was first most often used in material science and not philosophy or religion. It described how certain metals, when heated, lost their shape and when cooled, recovered their original form (or at least were not permanently deformed.)

In the 1970's, epidemiology applied the term "resilience" to studying why some people got ill and others did not. The goal was to offer guidance on ways to prevent illness.

Now, Psychology Today defines resilience as "that ineffable quality that allows some people to be knocked down by life and come back at least as strong as before. Rather than letting difficulties or failure overcome them and drain their resolve, they find a way to rise."

Yet, rarely, do we humans find a way to rise outside of our relationships with other human beings: family members, friends, neighbors, school, a spiritual community such as TUUC.

Our Soul Matters Circle introduction defines resilience in spiritual terms:

"....while resilience has a lot to do with what is inside us, it equally depends on what is between us. This is where our Soul Matters framing is so important: we are indeed a people of resilience. Forget solo act; think community choir! We survive our pain by having the strength to tell others about it. We find the courage to make our way through the dark only when we sense we are not alone. Internal and individual grit only gets us so far; empathy, assurance and love from others gets us the rest of the way. Resilience has everything to do with the water within which we swim and the web of connections that surround us. Resilient people arise from resilient relationships!"

This month, in worship, we will explore spiritual practices that develop individual and communal resilience.

One such spiritual practice is stewardship of our community. This is the time of year when we ask one another to make a financial pledge for the coming fiscal year. One way we live out our values in the world is to invest in them. We make an annual pledge to support our mission to deepen our ethical and spiritual lives as we work together for racial, social, and environmental justice. Resilient people arise from resilient relationships. May our resilient relationships create a resilient budget for TUUC.

FROM THE BOARD

* Supporting proposed legislation and/or public policy *

The Green Sanctuary Committee asked in December, 2019 if TUUC could sign on as an organization supporting Coal Community Transition in Maryland. The Sierra Club has chosen this issue as a priority for 2020 and already had UU Legislative Ministry of Maryland as well as the Cedar Lane and Columbia UU churches as signatories.

We had some emails back and forth and Rev. Clare reminded us that, a number of years ago, the congregation passed a policy on making endorsements and/or position statements. This policy is listed starting on page 3 of our current policy manual (dated 2006).

The Board of Trustees, at our January 15 meeting, discussed a resolution on supporting legislation and/or public policy. The following resolution was adopted by the Board last week:

In support of our Mission and for timely response during legislative sessions, the Board supports legislation proposed by and/or public policy positions taken by the Unitarian Universalist Legislative Ministry of Maryland (statelevel) or by Unitarian Universalists for Social Justice or Unitarian Universalist Ministry for Earth (both at the national-level), if such legislation or public policy position is supported by the appropriate Church committee or group. The Board permits the use of the Church's name in support of such legislation and/or public policy positions. The sponsoring committee will then provide information about the supported legislation to be included in the Threshold. This is effective through the remainder of

the current fiscal year, that is, to June 30, 2020.

** end of resolution **

Our Church actively participates in and supports UULM, UUSJ, and UUME. These groups work hard to stay current with possible legislation and public policy positions which align with UU Principles and support our Mission.

Timely response is essential to indicate support for proposed legislation. Should the Social Action Committee, the Green Sanctuary Committee, A Dialog on Race and Ethnicity, or other appropriate group support proposed legislation, and if this legislation is supported by UULM, UUSJ or UUME, then the Board authorizes the Church's name to be used in support of the proposed legislation.

This is more effective and less confusing than publicly stating that a Church committee supports the legislation. (For example, in the case of the Coal Community Transition, the Green Sanctuary Committee signed on as supporting the policy in December.)

The Board asks that the sponsoring committee then publicize information about the proposed legislation in the Threshold, for Church member awareness. Other communication methods to spur letter writing and calls to elected officials are also encouraged.

LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

The 2020 Maryland General Assembly session has begun! TUUC partners with the UU Legislative Ministry of Maryland, which will focus this year on legislative activity in the areas of climate change and the environment, economic justice, criminal justice, medically-assisted end of life, gun violence, healthcare, and immigration. You can get more information about current UULM legislation and sign up for email updates at <u>http://www.uulmmd.org</u>. Override votes are expected early in the session on legislation which would transfer handgun permit reviews away from a board appointed by the governor, and prohibit employers from asking about criminal records in initial job applications.

UULM-supported immigration-related issues include HB 0388, restricting law enforcement's cooperation with ICE, and HB 0403, which requires the Attorney General to develop guidelines for courthouses, schools, and hospitals to limit immmigration enforcement on their premises.

Also please contact your Senators to express opposition to SB 0197, requiring notification to Homeland Security before release of some immigrant prisoners.

Watch this space for updates as bill numbers are assigned to initiatives of TUUC partners and hearing dates are scheduled.

The 2017 book "Drawdown" talks about the 100 most effective solutions to combat carbon emissions to help curb global warming. All of the suggested solutions

are currently available and have been vetted by scientists in those respective fields. The premise is that if we employ these techniques sufficiently, we can not only limit global warming, but can actually drawdown carbon from the atmosphere. It seems like a ray of hope and a way to make a difference individually and collectively.
