# What does it mean to be a people of resilience?

# FEBRUARY 16, 2020 9:30 AND 11:15 AM Two Teachers of Resilience

Rev. Clare L. Petersberger, Monica Sweidel
Two female teachers of resilience were born
on February 18<sup>th</sup> (though not the same year.)
One said ""When I dare to be powerful, to
use my strength in the service of my vision,
then it becomes less and less important
whether I am afraid." The other said, "There
is no time for despair, no place for self-pity,
no need for silence, no room for fear. We
speak, we write, we do language. That is how
civilizations heal." Today we reflect on lessons
taught by these paragons of resilience. We
will also honor Monica Sweidel and her
contributions to TUUC before she moves
to Virginia.

Young Religious Unitarian Universalists (YRUU) Teens from our vibrant youth group have been thinking about and discussing what resilience means to them as people coming of age in uncertain times.

# **RELIGIOUS EXPLORATION**

Our three younger groups will start out upstairs in the service and then be sung down to join with friends new and old for their class or group.

# Kindergarten/First Grade World of Wonder: Nature's Partnerships

This session introduces the importance of partnerships in the web of life. A story about partnership between sea anemones and clown fish demonstrates that helping one another is an aspect of interdependence. Children experience the benefits of partnership by working together cooperatively. Participants are introduced to leadership roles they will take on over the course of the program.

# 2nd/3rd Grade Faithful Journeys: Unconditional Love

This group continues to have great discussions about sexuality, health, and values. This group meets at 11 am in Room 6.

In this session, a story about Hosea Ballou (1771-1852), one of the most influential preachers of Universalism, introduces participants to the first Unitarian Universalist Principle, the inherent worth and dignity of every person. The story, "Muddy Children,"

describes a young Ballou whose father loves him unconditionally despite his tendency to get muddy.

Discussion and activities amplify the story's teaching, reassuring participants that they, like Hosea Ballou, are loved and worthy even when they are literally muddy or have made a mistake. The signpost "Respect Everyone" is added to the Faithful Journeys Path.

# 4th-6th Grade Harry and UU: Fighting Animal Cruelty

This class starts learning about the horcrux of environmental degradation.

# Our Whole Lives sexuality education (7th-9th)

This group continues to have great discussions about sexuality, health, and values. This group meets at 11 am in Room 6.

# \* Update on Board resolution supporting proposed legislation and/or public policy \*

Details and background information on a Board resolution were published on January 24 (and on January 31). No protests to the policy were received by Neil Porter prior to the 10-day deadline of February 3. The Board's resolution becomes effective as of February 4, 2020:

In support of our Mission and for timely response during legislative sessions, the Board supports legislation proposed by and/or public policy positions taken by the Unitarian Universalist Legislative Ministry of Maryland (state-level) or by Unitarian Universalists

for Social Justice or Unitarian Universalist Ministry for Earth (both at the national-level), if such legislation or public policy position is supported by the appropriate Church committee or group. The Board permits the use of the Church's name in support of such legislation and/or public policy positions. The sponsoring committee will then provide information about the supported legislation to be included in the Threshold. This is effective through the remainder of the current fiscal year, that is, to June 30, 2020.

## YOUR VIGILANCE IS NEEDED

Spam/Phishing/Scam Emails

Some of us received an email this week that appeared to be from someone we knew, Mike Robinson, and appeared to request gift cards for his niece. This was not sent by Mike.

All of us need to be aware that spam and phishing emails are very common. In the past year, there was also an email that appeared to come from our Board President Neil Porter and another that appeared to come from our Minister, Rev. Clare Petersberger. All requested donations - money or gift cards. Do not buy a gift card or send money if you receive such a request. These are not legitimate.

If TUUC is requesting gift cards for our community partners, you will see an announcement in the Threshold and hear about it on Sunday morning.

Characteristics of Spam/Phishing Emails:

- appear on the surface to come from someone you know and trust
- request money or gift cards, sometimes for a relative or for a cause
- often have a reason why the person is requesting it, e.g. they are traveling or ill and can't take care of this themselves (and they offer to pay you back).

We are generous people and want to respond when someone we know and trust requests help. Learn the signs so that you recognize spam and phishing emails.







# **DENOMINATIONAL MINUTE**

This issue reports on the Unitarian University Legislative Ministry of Maryland (UULM-MD) activities and report and recent lobbying by TUUC members Steve Finner and Kathy Ramirez on two bills supported by the UULM -MD and others.

UULM\_MD: This past week saw our first victories with the override of two gubernatorial vetoes, the first approval of a gun violence bill on the House floor, and the introduction of most of our other priority bills. On Thursday, January 30, both houses overrode vetoes by Governor Hogan on important bills passed in 2019:

Gun Violence: SB 1000/HB 1343 Handgun
Permit Review Board - Repeal - this bill
abolishes the politically appointed board that
was routinely overturning decisions by the
State Police denying permits to carry
handguns. Appeals will instead go to the
Office of Administrative Hearings (OAH)
which is the nonpolitical agency with
Administrative Law Judges who decide
appeals of other administrative agency
decisions across the Executive Branch.

Immigration: SB 537/HB 262 <u>Dream Act</u> <u>Expansion</u> - the 2012 MD DREAM Act offered in-state tuition rates at public colleges, universities and community colleges to undocumented students (Dreamers) if they graduated from a MD high school; the student then had to attend a community college in the county of her high school; the extension removes the requirement that the student must attend a community college in her high school district and can apply directly to a four-year public college or university paying in-state tuition rates. It also removes

onerous tax proof requirements and protects DACA and TPS students who may lose their in-state status if the Trump Administration cancels these programs.

Also on January 30, the House of Delegates passed House Bill 4 on Second Reader. This bill would include long guns in the requirement for background checks before purchase or transfer of the firearm. The bill will be brought up for Third Reader and final approval in the House before it is sent to the Senate for consideration. Its companion bill, SB 208, had a hearing scheduled in the Judiciary Committee, Wednesday, February 5, 2020.

TUUC members Kathy Ramirez and Steve Finner lobbied in Annapolis on January 27 and 28. Kathy reports that members from UULM and several other organizations joined CASA Maryland in Annapolis.

The four main focus points were 1) Over-ride the Veto of the Dream Act Expansion : we won Thursday, 2) HB 677 Dignity not Detention, 3) HB 403 Safe Access for All, 4) HB 388 Privacy Protection, as well as Trust Act and the facial recognition software concerns.

The crowd filled two rooms and overflowed into the hallway. Numerous speakers included a woman whose husband was detained just hours before and political representatives like Shelley Hellerman.

Steve writes: I joined 150 people lobbying in support of HB 643-Medical Aid in Dying. The event was very well organized by Compassion and Choices

(<a href="https://compassionandchoices.org/">https://compassionandchoices.org/</a>), a national organization working to give people with a terminal illness the right to decide how and when they will die.
