

The Wisdom Of Lent NEW MEMBER RECOGNITION SUNDAY Rev. Clare L. Petersberger, Karyn Marsh,

Membership Chair, Stephen Brown-Pearn, Dominique Hall and new members Our spiritual question for March is: "What does it mean to be a people of wisdom?" From 1938 until 1960, Unitarians and Universalists answered this question through the annual publication of a Lenten manual. Yes, you read this correctly. The Unitarians and Universalists published a Lenten manual with meditation and prayers for each of the days between Ash Wednesday and Easter. What wisdom was contained in these manuals for theologically diverse Unitarians and Universalists? And what might this tradition of taking forty days for reflection mean for us as a people of wisdom today?



Today, we formally welcome new members. Wisdom is found in turning the world upside down---if

only for a brief time. Having just experienced the change of Daylight Saving Time, today we ask, "What would a UU festival of Clown Wisdom look like?"

RELIGIOUS EXPLORATION

Our three younger groups will start out upstairs in the service and then be sung down to join with friends new and old for their class or group.

Kindergarten/First Grade World of Wonder: Thanks Be to Trees No shade tree? Blame not the sun but yourself. — Chinese proverb

This session focuses on the vital role trees play in our ecosystems, as imaginatively told in a story about a young girl in India (based on the Chipko—or "tree-hugging" movement in India). Children will physically embody a tree in an activity that teaches the purpose of each part of a tree. A guided meditation promotes a spiritual connection with the life cycle of a tree.

2nd/3rd Grade

Faithful Journeys: Welcoming Superman

This session uses the story of Unitarian Universalist Christopher Reeve to examine our first Unitarian Universalist Principle, the inherent worth and dignity of every person.

After a fall from a horse, Reeve went from being an active, athletic man who portrayed Superman on-screen to losing the ability to move his body below the neck. Reeve went on to live a different kind of heroism as an advocate for research and support to help people with spinal cord injuries. He spoke to Congress and many other audiences. He founded the Christopher and Dana Reeve Foundation, which funds research on spinal cord injuries and offers grants to improve the lives of people who have become disabled.

Christopher Reeve's story serves as a springboard to issues of inclusion as children

are guided to reflect on the ways we affirm the worth and dignity of every person. They learn how our congregations affirm our first Principle when we provide accessibility to people of differing abilities, and they consider what it means when we fail to provide such a welcome.

Participants explore what they can accomplish without using physical abilities they ordinarily rely on. As they broaden their thinking about what constitutes "ability" or "disability," children also learn that each of us has the capacity to use our personal agency to do good in the world — no matter how we are "abled."

4th-6th Grade

Harry and UU: Fighting Environmental Dangers This class continues to learn about the horcrux of environmental degradation. This Sunday they learn about native plants and their importance to supporting wildlife and prepare seed packets and instructions for the congregation.

7th-9th Grade

Our Whole Lives Sexuality Education

This group will attend the 11:15 am service that the YRUU group is presenting. Parents, look for information in parent email about upcoming overnight Friday, March 20 to Saturday March 21.

Sign up to enter the contest. Not a Chili maker – No problem; how about contributing some fixings – sour cream,



GREEN SANCTUARY

Friday, March 13th. The Green Sanctuary Committee and ADORE present *The Condor and the Eagle,* an award-winning



documentary film about four indigenous leaders who embark on an extraordinary transcontinental adventure from the Canadian plains to deep into the heart of the Amazonian jungle to unite the peoples of North and

South America and deepen the meaning of "Climate Justice".

Their path through the jungle takes them on an unexpectedly challenging and liberating journey, which will forever change their attachment to the Earth and one another.

There is no charge for this program, but donations will be accepted for the UUMFE (UU Ministry for Earth), which is an executive producer of this film. UUMFE will use the funds to bring the filmmakers, protagonists, and other Indigenous partners to the UUA's General Assembly (where reckoning with colonization and UU colonial history, and committing to Indigenous solidarity, will be a major focus), and to support ongoing UU organizing in partnership and solidarity with Indigenous leaders through the UUA Create Climate Justice campaign. **Vegetarian Potluck begins at 6:30, with the movie beginning about 7:15 PM.**

LOBBYING IN ANNAPOLIS

On Monday February 17, 2020, TUUC

members Kathy Ramirez, Marilyn Anikisis, and Jane D'Ambrogi met with legislators/their TA's and



dropped off material on bills supported by UULM, ACLU, JUFJ (Jews United for Justice) and Out for Justice (one of our community partners). We took part in the Woman's rally and cheered on fellow UU's and other friends as we passed each other in the hallways.

NO CHILD GOES HUNGRY (NCGH),

A nonprofit based in Northern VA. **awarded TUUC a grant of \$1000** to help feed hungry children.

Several years ago, Assistance Center of Towson Churches started the program Food For Thought. This program packs food each Friday for children receiving school lunches. This provides them with food for the weekends. It has been a very successful program. The Social Action Committee .has approved giving this grant to ACTC for Food For Thought. The grant will provide food for 30 children for 5 weeks.

Wednesday, March 4 @ 7:30 downstairs <u>Circe</u> by Madeline Miller (fiction, 2018, 400 pages)




