RELIGIOUS EXPLORATION

Our three younger groups will start out upstairs in the service and then be sung down to join with friends new and old for their class or group.

Kindergarten/First Grade

World of Wonder: Thanks Be to Trees

No shade tree? Blame not the sun but yourself. — Chinese proverb

This session focuses on the vital role trees play in our ecosystems, as imaginatively told in a story about a young girl in India (based on the Chipko—or "tree-hugging" — movement in India). Children will physically embody a tree in an activity that teaches the purpose of each part of a tree. A guided meditation promotes a spiritual connection with the life cycle of a tree.

2nd/3rd Grade

Faithful Journeys: Finding Balance

This session explores the second Unitarian Universalist Principle: justice, equity, and compassion in human relationships. Participants discover how, by finding balance in their own lives, they can promote equity across the interdependent web of life. They experience sharing resources and finding

enjoyment with scant material possessions. We will add the signpost, "Find Balance," to our Faithful Journeys Path.

4th-6th Grade

Harry and UU: Fighting Environmental Dangers

This class continues to learn about the horcrux of environmental degradation. This Sunday they will discuss how to have more sustainable households and make bird feeders using food that might have been discarded (stale bagels from church coffee hour). This will be the last Harry and UU session; on March 8, Our Whole Lives sexuality education for 4th-6th graders starts for those whose parents have attended an orientation session.

7th-9th Grade

Our Whole Lives sexuality education

This group meets at 11 am in Room 6.

Wisdom

This group meets at 11:15 in Room 7. They will be discussing the theme of the month and plans for the rest of the year, and reviewing the service they gave two weeks ago.

CLARE'S COLLOQUY

Many years ago, in a sermon delivered to the Unitarian Universalist General Assembly, a colleague shared that if she could be granted one wish, she knew exactly what it would be: "I would be wise."

This begs the question, "What is wisdom?" Our English word for wisdom comes from the Proto-Indo-European root *weid* meaning "to see." And it is associated with the Sanskrit *veda* "I know."

Wisdom has to do less with information and more with deep knowing and a wide perspective.

For example, Tolstoy said there are only three key questions in life: When is the best time to do things? Who is the most important one? What is the right thing to do?

When I asked Siri these three questions, Siri produced articles from the web on the best time of day to do things, articles on how

winning is the most important, and an app to figure out the right thing to do.

I did not find Tolstoy's answers that the most important time is now; the most important person is the one you are with; and the right thing to do is good for that person.

As Tolstoy illustrates, wisdom isn't just information. Wisdom guides our decisions and actions.

I think of the character Scotty, in Star Trek, asking Captain Kirk, "Is that wise, Captain?" Information was part of any decision the Captain was making, but Scotty often reminded him of ethical implications at stake.

Wisdom, as spiritual teaching, is highly valued in the world's religions. Sacred texts from the Vedas to the Quran collect the wisdom of human beings through time. And our own faith tradition lifts up, as one of our

sources, the wisdom of the world's religions which inspire us in our ethical and spiritual lives.

Where do you turn for sources of wisdom?

Kent Nerburn, an American author focusing on Native American and American culture and general spirituality writes, *"There are many ways to seek wisdom. There is travel, there are masters, there is service. There is staring into the eyes of children and elders and lovers and strangers. There is sitting silently in one spot and there is being swept along in life's turbulent current. Life itself will grant you wisdom in ways you may neither understand nor choose."*

This month, in worship, we will explore sources of wisdom as we reflect on the question, "What does it mean to be a people of wisdom?" Please bring your wisdom to share!

meditation group, ADORE discussions, and House & Grounds work parties.

PROPOSED TUUC BYLAWS REVISIONS

Since November 2019, the Bylaws Committee has been reviewing TUUC's Bylaws and making recommendations for their revision. The Board approved changes to Articles 2 (Purpose) and 3 (Membership) for ratification at the June Annual Congregational Meeting. The proposed articles were sent out via email to members. They are included as an appendix to the Threshold. The Board welcomes comments and questions from the congregation. We will be having town halls on these and other Bylaws changes on **Sunday, March 22**, in the main meeting room both **in between services** and after the second service at 12:45 pm. All are welcome.

PROPOSED REVISED BYLAWS

ARTICLE TWO – PURPOSE

The purpose of this Church is to promote the spiritual growth of individuals and transform society into a more just, equitable, and compassionate community. Bound by this common purpose, and committed to

freedom of belief, we hold in unity of spirit a diversity of conviction.

ARTICLE THREE – MEMBERSHIP

SECTION ONE - Principles. This Church welcomes into membership all persons who are in sympathy with the Principles of Unitarian Universalism and this Church's mission, regardless of race, ethnicity, religious background, national origin, sex, sexual and affectional orientation, gender identity and expression, political persuasion, marital status, age, income, or disability and without requiring adherence to any particular religious belief or creed.

SECTION TWO – Requirements for

Membership. Any person who is at least eighteen years of age and is in sympathy with the purposes and programs of this Church may become a member by:

- (a) Participating in a new member orientation that includes discussion of this Church's mission, the Principles of Unitarian Universalism, and the responsibilities and privileges of membership;
- (b) Signing the Membership Book in the presence of the Membership Chair, a Board officer, or the Minister;
- (c) Making an annual financial contribution (unless it has been waived at the discretion of the Treasurer or the Treasurer's designee);
- (d) Participating, as they are able, in this Church's programs.

SECTION THREE – Rights of Membership.

Members may vote on all matters at duly-called congregational meetings and serve as chairpersons of committees, trustees, or officers of this Church. Members shall become eligible to vote thirty (30) days after

they sign the Membership Book and make a financial contribution of record.

SECTION FOUR – Termination of Membership.

Any person having become a voting member shall continue to be a voting member until:

(a) They give written notice of resignation to the Minister, Membership Chair, or Board;

(b) No financial contribution of record has been made on their behalf in the previous and current fiscal year up to 60 days before the date of the annual congregational meeting;

(c) Their membership status is terminated by the Board for cause, as determined by a two-thirds vote of the Board, provided that the member has the right to appear before the Board and right of appeal.

Meat Chili, Vegetable Chili, Gluten Free Chili - Mild-Hot-Fiery - What's your specialty?

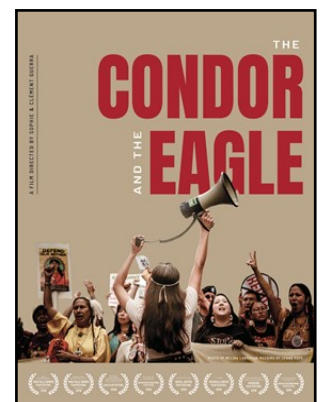

The Green Sanctuary Committee and ADORE present *The Condor and the Eagle*, an award-winning documentary film about four indigenous leaders who embark on an extraordinary trans-continental adventure from the Canadian plains to deep



into the heart of the Amazonian jungle to unite the peoples of North and South America and deepen the meaning of “Climate Justice”.

Their path through the jungle takes them on an unexpectedly challenging and liberating journey, which will forever change their attachment to the Earth and one another.

There is no charge for this program, but donations will be accepted for the UUMFE (UU Ministry for Earth), which is an executive producer of this film. 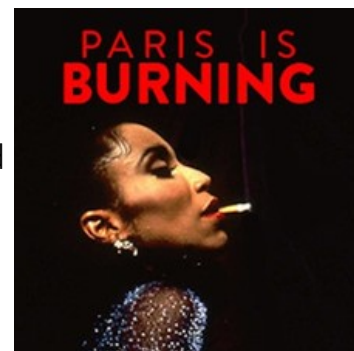

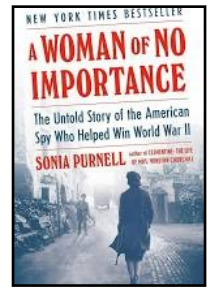

A Woman of No Importance

by Sonia Purnell

(non-fiction, 2019, 368 pages)

In this fast-paced biography, Sonia Purnell tells the story of Virginia Hall, an American spy who worked undercover in France during World War II for Britain's Special Operations Executive (SOE). Hall's story is a surprising one: she began her life in Baltimore, Maryland with a mother who wished for the perfect debutante. Hall chose a different path. She drove ambulances in France, and was recruited by a recently formed SOE as a spy in occupied France. Hall posed as a newspaper reporter, enlisting civilians for the French Resistance and establishing an underground network of allies and becoming one of the most important spies during World War II. Purnell does an amazing job bringing Hall's exploits to life and has crafted a gripping and cinematic biography for an unsung hero of wartime espionage. Chosen as a BEST BOOK OF THE YEAR by *NPR*, the New York Public Library, the *Seattle Times*, the *Washington Independent Review of Books*, Book Browse, the *Spectator*, and the *Times of London*

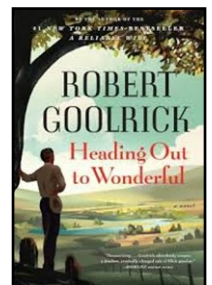

It is the summer of 1948 when a handsome, charismatic stranger, Charlie Beale, recently back from the war in Europe, shows up in the town of Brownsburg, a sleepy village nestled in the Valley of Virginia.



All he has with him are two suitcases: one contains his few possessions, including a fine set of butcher knives; the other is full of money. A lot of money. *Heading Out to Wonderful* is a haunting, heart-stopping novel of love gone terribly wrong in a place

where once upon a time such things could happen. Booklist review says that it is "Finely crafted fiction from a captivating writer."

DENOMINATIONAL MINUTE

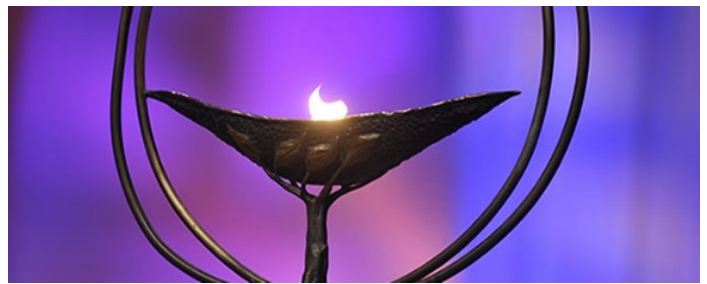
Baltimore Cluster hold first face-to-face meeting. On the road to being re-established, the Baltimore Cluster of UU Congregations met Saturday, February 29, at First Unitarian Church in Baltimore. This meeting was scheduled after three Zoom virtual conference meetings were held last fall.

Twenty-eight UU's were in attendance. Present were representatives from First Unitarian, Towson, Cedarhurst, Fallston and Channing Memorial in Ellicot City. Representing our church were Steve Finner, Karyn Marsh, Sue Royer, and Tom Zeller.

The primary focus of the group was a workshop "Building An Inclusive Community", led by Paula Cole Jones, our regional staff contact from the Central East Region of the UUA. Much of the day was spent in small group sessions discussing such questions as how do our congregations fit together, why have a cluster, what do we need, and what do we have to offer each other. Also discussed was "Multiculturalism and UU Evolution". How can our congregations be more diverse? What challenges do we face, and what would progress look like. As befitting Unitarian Universalists at the start of a journey, there was much discussion of all of these questions with few answers. However, that was the intent of this initial

meeting. More information will be forthcoming as we plan for our next meeting. To that end, a Zoom virtual conference will be held later this month.

UU Faithify: Many individual Unitarian Universalists, and many congregations and groups of congregations often have needs and ideas for both broadening and deepening our faith, but don't have the resources to transform these ideas into action.

Dear TUUC Community,

With the news surrounding the COVID-19 outbreak around the world and cases in the U.S., it's natural for fears and questions to arise. With that in mind, I am writing to you about how to care for yourselves, and, as people of both resilience and wisdom (our Soul Matters words for February and March), how we will care for one another as a spiritual community.

Maintaining Health Phase

Right now, we are in a "maintaining health" phase. This includes the following advice, drawn from guidelines from the CDC:

Practice hygiene precautions:

- ⇒ **Wash your hands often and for 20 seconds.** Ideally with non-anti-bacterial soap and running water. If that is not available, then alcohol-based hand sanitizer.
- ⇒ **Use ONLY your knuckle to touch light switches, elevator buttons, etc.** Lift the gasoline dispenser with a paper towel or use a disposable glove. Open public doors the same way.
- ⇒ **Notice how often you touch your face** – we all touch our faces way more than you would ever think. Your awareness may help reduce this behavior, which is one of the ways any virus is spread. **Avoid touching your eyes, nose, or mouth.**
- ⇒ **Avoid sharing utensils, cups, towels, and other items. Wash these items thoroughly.**
- ⇒ **Stock canned, dry, frozen foods for two weeks if you can---as well as regular medication.** This is the wisdom of *Scientific American* <https://blogs.scientificamerican.com/observations/preparing-for-coronavirus-to-strike-the-u-s/> The idea of “flattening the curve” has great appeal.
- ⇒ **Explain COVID-19 and good hygiene to children:** <https://www.npr.org/sections/goatsandsoda/2020/02/28/809580453/just-for-kids-a-comic-exploring-the-new-coronavirus>
- ⇒ **Develop a preparedness plan for your household.** Talk about this plan with other family members (such as at dinnertime) to build consensus and “buy in.” Rev. Julia Hamilton wrote the ditty we sang on Sunday (and will sing again.) Lora Powell Haney posted the tune on the TUUC Facebook page. The song could be adapted to “Family, wanderer, lover of cleaning, Rinsing the germs off is vital to do, wash, rinse, and repeat.” Post the family plan on the refrigerator.

Get lots of sleep, manage stress, drink fluids and eat healthy foods, and maintain the physical and spiritual practices that keep you feeling healthy.

- ⇒ **Facemasks have little evidence of widespread benefit outside of clinical settings.** They must be worn correctly, removed properly, and disposed of safely. **They are important for people who are infected to wear.**
- ⇒ **Cover your mouth and nose with a tissue when sneezing (disposing of them frequently), or sneeze into your sleeve elbow.**
- ⇒ **If you are sick, STAY HOME** – from work, from school, from TUUC. You care not only for yourself this way, you care for those with whom you would have come into contact. Not everybody you encounter has a strong immune system. Consider the impact of your germs on others. Some

people have jobs that do not currently have a liberal sick leave policy. Hopefully, this will change as we have watched the spread of this virus in real time as leaders in Iran were interviewed on television. **If you are sick, STAY HOME.**

- ⇒ **Reach out** by phone or email to let someone know you are ill ~ that includes me (Rev. Clare), if you'd like. Just because you are sick, doesn't mean you have to be isolated.

PLAN FOR TUUC

For Worship

- ⇒ We are planning to bathe the stones we drop in 10% Clorox.
- ⇒ **For the time being, we will exchange hand holding before the closing words for gentle elbow bumps or bowing with a Namaste or putting one's own hands over one's heart. And we encourage greeting one another after worship with a bow and "Namaste" rather than a hug.**
- ⇒ We will encourage hospitality servers to wear food preparation gloves and begin to plan for treats that do not entail many hands touching the same open plate.

Disruption Phase

- ⇒ If a widespread outbreak occurs in the U.S., particularly in our area, we will follow state and federal recommendations about shutting down programs, following the example of local schools and businesses. During such a time, staff would telecommute, and we would try to provide services and programs electronically as much as possible. We are currently looking at YouTube as one way to broadcast worship services and Zoom (a video conferencing platform) as a means to hold programs and meetings and bring people together safely.
- ⇒ If we experience any deaths, we will attempt to communicate this transition and safe ways to mourn together with all our members through our website, Facebook page, voicemail message, and Bulletin Board. This will continue as long as federal or state guidelines to avoid public places are in place.

Rebuilding Community Phase

- ⇒ **When all restrictions are lifted, we will resume our regular church activities and work to rebuild our community.**

This is being shared in the spirit of preparing for what may come based on limited knowledge of, and experience with, this new virus.

What we do know is the importance of human caring. On Sunday, I quoted Dr. Timothy Brewer, a public health expert who said, **"Remember to not let fear override your common humanity about how you treat other people...Just remember we're all in this together."** We are all in this together. This is a virus. No individual or ethnicity or culture is "to blame" for this virus.

We are all in this together. Let us take good care of ourselves and others.
