PROPOSED BYLAWS CHANGES – OUR PROCESS

The first step in updating our bylaws in support of our governance change was to jettison the Operations Team. Those changes were approved at a congregational meeting on October 27, 2019. The Board appointed a Bylaws Committee that same month with the following members serving:

Karyn Marsh and Art Starr, both Trustees-at-Large Dan Alper, former Trustee-at-Large and member of the Governance Task Force Herb Shankroff and Linda Talley, both past TUUC Presidents

The Bylaws Committee met regularly and reviewed our existing bylaws, suggested changes from Rev. David Pyle, who performed a governance assessment for TUUC in 2016-17, and the bylaws of other UU churches. As each article was reviewed and proposed changes were drafted, the changes went to the Board for discussion. Sometimes additional changes were made. Then each article was sent to members of the congregation for review and feedback.

Article Two – Purpose – proposed changes sent 2/21/20

Article Three – Membership – proposed changes sent 2/21/20

Article Four – Congregation and Cong. Meetings – proposed changes sent 5/21/20

Article Five – Board of Trustees – proposed changes sent 5/21/20

Article Seven – Committees – proposed changes sent 4/1/20

Article Nine – Fiscal Provisions – proposed changes sent 4/1/20

Each email invited comments or feedback via email by a specific date.

The Board conducted a listening session on April 19 at 1 pm via Zoom. In addition to Board members and Bylaws Committee members, seven people attended. Feedback received during

that listening session was incorporated into the final proposed version of the bylaws changes that was sent on 5/29/20.

We look forward to any further discussion and voting on these changes at our congregational meeting on June 14 at 12 noon.

CLARE'S COLLOQUY

About five weeks ago, two mourning doves began building a nest outside one of our windows. This annual ritual of preparing for new life felt so reassuring in the midst of a pandemic.

Shortly after, on a Saturday afternoon, terrible caws announced impending doom. Grey feathers of a morning dove flew up in front of the window as a large crow descended. The terrible caws continued. When I walked outside, the nest, which I do not believe had any eggs in it, was in bits and pieces. Following this violence and destruction, the mourning doves did not return to rebuild at our house. Absence became the greatest presence. The calls of the mourning doves could be heard further down the block.


But then, just over two weeks ago, I noticed the mother mourning dove sitting on a nest slightly away from where the first one was begun at our home. They had returned to build their second nest at our house.

When the news repeatedly showed the horror of the murder of George Floyd in broad daylight by someone sworn to protect the public, I went to look at the mother bird protecting her eggs. When the news showed images of shouting and the streets of America burning, I listened as the mourning dove parents cooed to each other about feeding their hungry babies. When the reports came from clergy of being pelted with rubber bullets and sprayed with tear gas in Lafayette Square during a peaceful protest just so the President could have a photo op holding a Bible, my mind flashed back to the descent of the crows. I went to check on the nest. The head of one parent bobbed up and

down while the other parent sat watch for any outside threats.

The mourning doves have reminded me of what we are called to do as people of faith: build, nurture, protect, feed, work together, rebuild when necessary, and partner all for the sake of the most vulnerable. Birds may not have a sense of justice, but we humans do. In the words of the banners at TUUC: Black Lives Matter.

I am grateful for TUUC's public commitment to racial justice. As the mourning dove fledglings take flight, my hope is that we will continue to lift our voices, lend a listening ear, write letters, speak up and out, offer financial support, partner with others and with other organizations, and contribute in whatever ways we can to bending the moral arc of the universe towards racial justice and creating a better future together.



CLARE'S COLLOQUY ON COVID CARE FUND

While preparing the TUUC Needs Assessment in March, I noticed that questions that colleagues were asking members of their congregation included "Would you be willing to contribute to a fund to help members in financial need?" and "Are you in need of financial assistance?"

Since then, I have received four inquiries from TUUC members asking if we could establish such a fund to support members and friends who have lost their jobs due to Covid. These members generously offered to donate as an expression of our mission to deepen our ethical and spiritual lives by exemplifying what it means to be a caring community. One person offered to make a contribution out of the CARES check being sent by the government. I was touched by these inquiries and the spirit of compassion in which they were made.

At its meeting on May 20, the TUUC Board voted to establish a TUUC COVID Care Fund for up to two years for the purpose of helping TUUC members who are in financial distress due to this pandemic. I am under no illusion that we are going to be able to meet all the financial needs that exist among us or will emerge in the next 12 to 18 months. But my hope is that some assistance with paying for a member's prescription, or toward rent or mortgage, or for groceries (if not eligible for ACTC assistance) will help to ease economic hardship due to COVID and help members going through tough times to feel the love and support of TUUC.

If you are able to donate to our newly established TUUC COVID Care Fund, please let our Bookkeeper know that your contribution is for the TUUC COVID Care Fund. Also, please know that no contribution may be designated for the benefit of a particular recipient.

If you are in need of financial assistance, please speak with me. All requests will be kept confidential.

In no way is this fund intended to take away from our support of the Assistance Center of Towson Churches. In fact, our fifth Sunday collection this coming Sunday, May 31, will be for the Assistance Center of Towson Churches. ACTC is in great need as they continue to work to provide food to people who are food deprived.

Our mission is to deepen our ethical and spiritual lives through service to others. Thank you for your compassion and for your generosity as we seek to care both for those within our spiritual community and those in the wider community. In the words of George Odell:

We need one another when we mourn and would be comforted... when we are in trouble and afraid... when we despair, in temptation, and need to be recalled to our best selves again.

We need one another when we would accomplish some great purpose, and cannot do it alone... in the hour of our successes, when we look for someone to share our triumphs [and] in the hour of our defeat when with encouragement we might endure and stand again.... All our lives we are in need, and others are in need of us. ---Rev. Clare

UUA GENERAL ASSEMBLY

General Assembly, the annual gathering of UUs to worship, vote, and do the work of our denomination, was planned to be held in Providence, RI this year. It has been switched to a 100% virtual event from June 24 through 28. There is a registration fee of \$150 and there are opportunities for scholarships from the UUA, as well as volunteer opportunities for those with technical skills. Registered



participants will have access to the GA Virtual Participation Portal, which combines multiple modes of participant engagement that include chat, Q&A, and polling. Registrants are able to watch and ask questions in live sessions including workshops and business sessions. Delegates are also be able to propose amendments in the live business sessions, participate in debates, and vote in general sessions. Some sessions will be streamed for all to view, without paying a registration fee.



Recently, I posted a link to Faithify.org on TUUC's Facebook page. Faithify is a web site for crowd funding of UU Projects. Following is more information. Faithify is a crowdfunding site where passionate people INSPIRE, UNITE, and FUND Unitarian Universalist ministries.

Faithify's purpose is to:

- Inspire a culture of innovation that extends the reach of UU values
- Lower the walls between existing congregations
- Ignite ministries in new venues, formats, and communities
- Bridge geographic and generational borders using 21st century technologies
- Help passionate individuals invest directly in ministries that excite them
- Help ministry innovators reach a passionate public

We envision a people with renewed faith and a Unitarian Universalism that is more connected, relevant, and vibrant.

Crowdfunding has fundamentally changed how we fund-raise. In being able to mobilize resources from everyday people, and rely on thousands of smaller donors rather than the institutional backing from governments, foundations, or even select donors with big pockets, now anyone can raise thousands of dollars with just the click of a button.

Changes in technology, culture, and newer generational mindsets are offering us new possibilities. 


