Meanwhile for those of you who want to try a Sardinian dish, below is an easy recipe for Sardinian spaghetti. I think it is the fennel and saffron that makes this dish evocative of Sardinian food. SARDINIAN SPAGHETTI FROM FOOD NETWORK

Ingredients:

- 1/4 cup extra-virgin olive oil
- 1 1/2 pounds sweet Italian fennel sausage, cut into 1-inch pieces
- 2 28-ounce cans whole peeled tomatoes, drained, seeded and halved, with 1/2 cup juice reserved
- 2 cloves garlic, sliced
- 2 bay leaves
- 1/2 teaspoon fennel seeds
- 1/4 teaspoon red pepper flakes
- 1/2 teaspoon saffron threads
- 1/4 cup chopped fresh parsley
- 1 1/2 cups fresh basil leaves, torn
- Kosher salt
- 3/4 pound spaghetti
- 1 cup shredded pecorino cheese

Directions:

Heat the oil in a large heavy skillet over medium heat. Add the sausage and cook, stirring occasionally, until brown, about 7 minutes. Push to one side of the skillet and increase the heat to high. Add the tomatoes, stirring to break them up a bit, and cook until the edges brown and the oil turns red, about 6 minutes. Stir the sausage and tomatoes together.

Add the garlic, bay leaves, fennel seeds and red pepper flakes to the skillet, then scatter the saffron over the mixture. Cook, stirring, about 2 minutes. Add the parsley, 1 cup basil and 1 teaspoon salt. Reduce the heat to medium and cook, stirring occasionally,

about 15 minutes.

Remove and discard the bay leaves.

Meanwhile, cook the spaghetti in a large pot of salted boiling water until al dente. Drain, reserving 1/2 cup pasta water. Add the spaghetti, cooking liquid and reserved tomato juice to the sausage sauce and toss, about 3 minutes. Top with the pecorino and the remaining 1/2 cup basil.

PROCEDURES FOR THE TUUC ANNUAL MEETING ON JUNE 14

We will be conducting our church's annual meeting on June 14 over Zoom. There will be a team of technical people and lay leaders set-up as Zoom co-hosts who will facilitate the meeting.

- Everyone will be muted upon entry and you will be able to unmute yourself
- Please wait to be recognized before speaking
- You are encouraged to keep your camera/video on so that we can see each other
- Voting will be conducted using the Polling feature of Zoom. We will explain the voting during the meeting. Polls will be set up so that two members on the same device can both vote. Those dialing in by phone, or on Chromebook computers will be invited to give their vote verbally. Co-hosts will vote using the Yes/No function inside Zoom. Only members may vote. If you are unsure if you are a Member, please contact membership@towsonuuc.org.
- We'll start with a meeting covenant
- The proposed rules of procedure include that we will vote on the proposed bylaws changes article by article, and separately, that we will not accept amendments to the bylaws from the floor. This requires a 2/3 majority. The Rev. David Pyle recommended that proposed changes to bylaws not be altered during the congregational meeting, but that they be presented for an up or down vote.

Discussion on each motion:

- Alternate between someone in favor, then someone opposed
- Participants indicate interest in speaking by using the Yes or No function inside Zoom, and wait to be recognized. Start by stating your name; if you are in favor or opposed to the matter under discussion, please state so before going on to speak.
- Two technical Ushers will keep track of who wants to speak and inform the Moderator.
- We will alternate in this fashion: Yes, No, Yes, No, then verbally asking if there is a phone or Chromebook participant who wishes to speak (or other person not able to signal the yes or no), then repeat.
- Participants are requested to limit time speaking to 2 minutes per person per topic
- Everyone should have an opportunity to speak before anyone speaks twice
- We encourage allowing all who have questions or comments to speak before closing discussion by calling the question.

The meeting will be recorded to aid our Board Secretary in keeping an accurate record of the business decisions. We intend to end the meeting by 2 pm or shortly thereafter, even if we have not completed all of the business on the agenda. We ask for your patience as we work through any issues that may arise during the meeting. Thank you!

PROPOSED BYLAWS CHANGES — OUR PROCESS

The first step in updating our bylaws in support of our governance change was to jettison the Operations Team. Those changes were approved at a congregational meeting on October 27, 2019. The Board appointed a Bylaws Committee that same month with the following members serving:

Karyn Marsh and Art Starr, both Trustees-at-Large
Dan Alper, former Trustee-at-Large and member of the Governance Task Force
Herb Shankroff and Linda Talley, both past TUUC Presidents

The Bylaws Committee met regularly and reviewed our existing bylaws, suggested changes from Rev. David Pyle, who performed a governance assessment for TUUC in 2016-17, and the bylaws of other UU churches. As each article was reviewed and proposed changes were drafted, the changes went to the Board for discussion. Sometimes additional changes were made. Then each article was sent to members of the congregation for review and feedback.

Article Two – Purpose – proposed changes sent 2/21/20

Article Three – Membership – proposed changes sent 2/21/20

Article Four – Congregation and Cong. Meetings – proposed changes sent 5/21/20

Article Five – Board of Trustees – proposed changes sent 5/21/20

Article Seven – Committees – proposed changes sent 4/1/20

Article Nine – Fiscal Provisions – proposed changes sent 4/1/20

Each email invited comments or feedback via email by a specific date.

The Board conducted a listening session on April 19 at 1 pm via Zoom. In addition to Board members and Bylaws Committee members, seven people attended. Feedback received during that listening session was incorporated into the final proposed version of the bylaws changes that was sent on 5/29/20.

We look forward to any further discussion and voting on these changes at our congregational meeting on June 14 at 12 noon.

CLARE'S COLLOQUY

About five weeks ago, two mourning doves began building a nest outside one of our windows. This annual ritual of preparing for new life felt so reassuring in the midst of a pandemic.

Shortly after, on a Saturday afternoon, terrible caws announced impending doom. Grey feathers of a mourning dove flew up in front of the window as a large crow

descended. The terrible caws continued. When I walked outside, the nest, which I do not believe had any eggs in it, was in bits and pieces. Following this violence and destruction, the mourning doves did not return to rebuild at our house. Absence became the greatest presence. The calls of the mourning doves could be heard further down the block.

But then, just over two weeks ago, I noticed the mother mourning dove sitting on a nest slightly away from where the first one was begun at our home. They had returned to build their second nest at our house.

When the news repeatedly showed the horror of the murder of George Floyd in broad daylight by someone sworn to protect the public, I went to look at the mother bird protecting her eggs. When the news showed images of shouting and the streets of America burning, I listened as the mourning dove parents cooed to each other about feeding their hungry babies. When the reports came from clergy of being pelted with rubber bullets and sprayed with tear gas in Lafayette Square during a peaceful protest just so the President could have a photo op holding a Bible, my mind flashed back to the descent of the crows. I went to check on the nest. The head of one parent bobbed up and down while the other parent sat watch for any outside threats.

The mourning doves have reminded me of what we are called to do as people of faith: build, nurture, protect, feed, work together, rebuild when necessary, and partner all for the sake of the most vulnerable. Birds may not have a sense of justice, but we humans do. In the words of the banners at TUUC: Black Lives Matter.

I am grateful for TUUC's public commitment to racial justice. As the mourning dove fledglings take flight, my hope is that we will continue to lift our voices, lend a listening ear, write letters, speak up and out, offer financial support, partner with others and with other organizations, and contribute in whatever ways we can to bending the moral arc of the universe towards racial justice and creating a better future together.

TUUC COVID CARE FUND

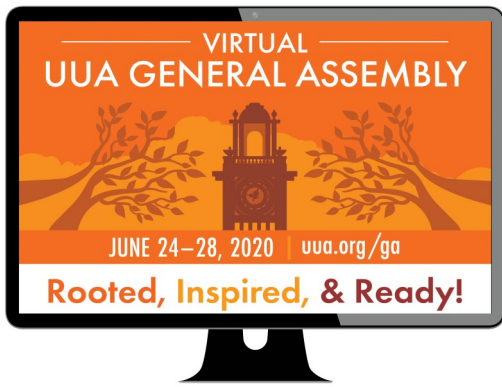

UUA GENERAL ASSEMBLY

General Assembly, the annual gathering of UUs to worship, vote, and do the work of our denomination, was planned to be held in Providence, RI this year. It has been switched to a 100% virtual event from June 24 through 28. There is a registration fee of \$150 and there are opportunities for scholarships from the UUA, as well as volunteer opportunities for those with technical skills. Registered participants will have access to the GA Virtual Participation Portal, which combines multiple modes of participant engagement that include chat, Q&A, and polling. Delegates are also be able to propose amendments in the live business sessions, participate in debates, and vote in general sessions. Some sessions will be streamed for all to view, without paying a registration fee.
