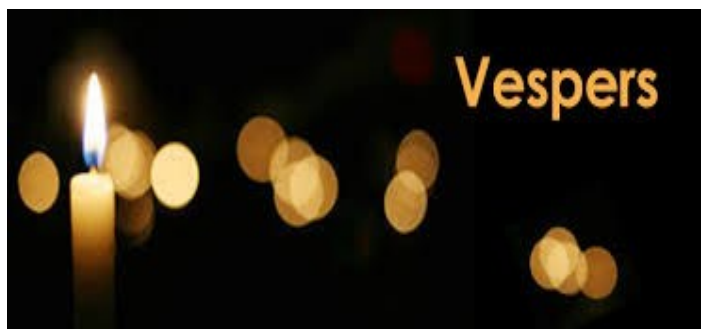

TUUC GOES TO THE UUA GENERAL ASSEMBLY

Why is this Sunday different from all other Sundays ever at TUUC? Because you are invited to join thousands of Unitarian Universalists in virtual space for Sunday morning worship for the 2020 Unitarian Universalist General Assembly. **This worship service will NOT be on Zoom.** It will be live streamed from a link on this website: <https://www.uua.org/ga/off-site/2020/sunday-worship>

The Reverend Joan Javier-Duval will deliver the sermon. She currently serves as Minister of the Unitarian Church of Montpelier, VT. The Rev. Mykal O’Neal Slack is worship leader. He is currently the Community Minister for Worship and Spiritual Care for Black Lives of Unitarian Universalism, an organization and growing spiritual community committed to

supporting Black folx in our faith, and a co-founder of the Transforming Hearts Collective, a ministry that both supports spaces for LGBTQ people to access resilience, healing, and spirituality and resources faith communities and other groups for the work of radical inclusion and culture shift. Benjie Messer is the music director at the 2020 General Assembly Sunday Morning Worship. He currently serves at the UU Congregation of Phoenix and has just completed the UUA's Music Leadership Certification Program. In the spirit of life-lines, let us join Unitarian Universalists from around the country and the world for this 10 a.m. Sunday morning worship service.



CLARE'S COLLOQUY

He was recovering from prostate cancer in Georgia when he joined a gay softball league. He had received strong performance evaluations for a decade for his work to protect children as the head of the Clayton County's Court Appointed Special Advocates program when he joined the Hotlanta Softball League in early 2013. Within five months he began to receive disparaging remarks for his sexual orientation and his participation in the gay softball league. A month later, he was fired from his job for "conduct unbecoming of a county employee." He was fired for being gay. He took his case arguing discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation to court. He took his case through many courts. He took his case to the Supreme Court.

And on the morning of June 15, 2020, Gerald Bostock was in a virtual meeting for work as a mental health counselor for adults at a hospital in Atlanta. He pulled up the SCOTUS blog and saw his name, saw his case had been decided. He asked to be excused from the meeting and rushed to download the decision. It wasn't easy. So many people were accessing it that the website crashed.

Ultimately, he saw that five justices had joined the most recently appointed justice, Justice Neil Gorsuch, a conservative, to rule that "Those who adopted the Civil Rights Act might not have anticipated their work would lead to this particular result...But the limits of the drafters' imagination supply no reason to ignore the law's demands." The ruling upholds that the 1964 Civil Rights Act's ban on employment discrimination based on "sex" also covers lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender and queer workers. Gerald Bostock let out a big scream and hugged his partner, Andy.

It all began because Gerald Bostock joined a gay softball league. Many of those players are still his friends. And now, thanks to him, they (and nine million other Americans) cannot be fired because of their sexual orientation or gender identity.

We Unitarian Universalists rejoice in this ruling for civil rights. Happy Pride month!

YOUTH RELIGIOUS EXPLORATION

I hope you and your family are starting to enjoy some of the pleasures of summer, longer evenings, time outside, maybe bike rides around your neighborhood. Have you seen your first fireflies of the season yet? The congregational meeting was long but enjoyable as we zoomed in from a shady spot on the back porch. Time spent outside in nature, whether a balcony, backyard, or park, can be a real source of spiritual sustenance.

The Youth Religious Exploration Committee met last week to see how we can support the spiritual growth and relationship needs of the children, teens, and adults in our program given current constraints. The results of the two zoom meetings for parents and the survey yielded a wide range of responses. Some families have children who enjoy seeing their friends in online meetings and participated regularly; other children, sometimes in the same family, do not want to participate in virtual meetings or get-togethers. Some families are enjoying the recorded family gatherings; others find it hard to remember to watch and miss interacting with other families. Some parents, especially those with younger children, found it too hard to participate in yet another zoom meeting after juggling their own work lives while they supervised their children's school meetings. Some families would relish safe ways to see each other in person outside; others would not participate in any in-person meetings for the foreseeable future. The desire to stay connected to others in our faith community was the common theme we heard.

Our plans for the summer include occasional, fun zoom get-togethers with themes such as dance, yoga, and cooking for those in Kindergarten through fourth grade, presented by Zinnia Epps and Angela Epps. Plans for a family game night and socially distanced hike are also underway. An informal venue for parents to meet through zoom will be offered a few times throughout the summer as requested by parents.

We are currently researching what other UU churches are offering and learning from UUA and CER (Central Eastern Region) professionals, as well as religious educators from Soul Matters and our local area. We hope to gain knowledge and ideas from all those resources and then finalize a plan for children and teens for fall. As always, we welcome your input and feedback as we move forward. We appreciate the church leadership, staff, teachers, and youth advisors who are helping us support the future generation of Unitarian Universalists.

DENOMINATIONAL MINUTE—THE BALTIMORE CLUSTER OF UU CONGREGATIONS

During the past year, I have periodically mentioned the Baltimore Cluster of UU Congregations (hereafter the cluster), which is a group of representatives from congregations in the Baltimore area.

The cluster was active quite a few years ago, but then congregations began to drift away and it ceased to exist. Last September, Paula Cole Jones, our liaison from the Central East Region, and a member of All Souls, Unitarian, D.C. asked me if I would be interested in helping her revive the cluster. She said that during the past few years, clusters have been established or re-established in Philadelphia and the Delmarva Peninsula, and the Washington area cluster has become more active. Paula Cole-Jones is the liaison to these clusters.

I agreed and we arranged our first meeting which took place last September. There are eight UU congregations in the Baltimore area who are at least, nominally members of the clusters. They are First Unitarian Church in Baltimore, Towson UU Church, Columbia UU Congregation, Channing Memorial Church in Ellicott City, Fallston UUs, Cedarhurst UUs, UU Fellowship of Harford County, and the UUs of Charlestown. Columbia is the largest with approximately 450 members. First Unitarian and Towson both have approximately 200 members. Hartford County has 150 members. Cedarhurst and Channing have approximately 50 members, while Fallston and Charlestown have around 20 members. Charlestown is a “covenanting community” which means they are not yet large enough to be recognized as a fellowship or church. They are all or mostly retirees, and services are lay led or led by

visiting clergy. Our own Karyn Marsh, who just graduated from Starr King School of Divinity has been bringing services to the group over the past year or so.

The first few meetings of the cluster focused on what should or can a cluster do. Are there long term or short term projects that the cluster could engage in? Is it desirable to share resources, human or otherwise? Does the cluster want to sponsor workshops on such subjects as worship and music, congregational polity and life span education. It was noted at the first meeting that in its previous life the cluster had sponsored a choir festival which was held at our congregation.

In December, our meeting was visited by two representatives of the Delmarva Cluster, which has eight members ranging in size from Wilmington with 350 members to much smaller congregations in Easton and Salisbury, MD and Dover, DE. The Delmarva cluster usually alternates monthly meetings between on line and face to face. They have sponsored a number of workshops on various topics and have a small budget, which is primarily used for communications, including a website (www.uudelmarva.org).

At our December meeting it was decided to have the first physical gathering of the Baltimore Cluster and plans were made to have the meeting February 29 at First Unitarian in Baltimore. Planning continued at the January meeting and we were pleased to welcome thirty registrants representing all eight of the cluster congregations at the February meeting, the major focus of which was a work shop led by Paula on building a

community of communities. Among other things, we learned a different model of polity and governance for UU groups. It was very well received.

Meetings since then have continued to focus on building the cluster as an organization and discussion of possible projects and activities. Cluster members have become very interested in UU The Vote, which is a project of the UUA focusing on increasing election turnout among marginalized communities across the nation. We have had two presentations on UU The Vote and related Maryland Legislative matters from Steve Buckingham, chairperson of the UU Legislative Ministry of Maryland, and also presentations on UU The Vote by Susan Leslie, Congregational Advocacy and Witness Director of the UUA, and Pamela Coukos and Kelsey Cowger of the Reeb Project which is affiliated with All Souls Church, Unitarian in Washington. The Reeb Project is named after Rev. James Reeb, who was an Associate Minister of All Souls when he was murdered in 1965 in Selma, Alabama.

The next project related to UU The Vote will be a workshop for members of cluster congregations conducted by Steve Buckingham sometime in the next six weeks. Announcement of the date, time and zoom link will be shared in the Threshold shortly.

Another project of the cluster has been formation of a virtual coffee klatch which takes place Fridays from 5-6 PM. on the new Facebook group of the cluster ((The Greater Baltimore UU Cluster).

And on Sunday July 26 from 1PM-3PM the cluster is sponsoring a common read, "Tell Me How It Ends-An Essay in Forty Questions"

by Valeria Luiselli. Zoom information will be forthcoming.

There is also an email group for the cluster, greaterbaltimoreuus@lists.cerguua.org. To be added to the list send a request for bcasebolt@uua.org. Cluster congregations are now posting news about events of interest at their congregations on both the email list and the Facebook page.

Attendance at cluster meetings varies. Some congregations, including ours, Fallston and Cedarhurst have had representatives at all meetings to date. In addition to myself, TUUC members who have attended one or more cluster meetings are Sue Royer, Karyn Marsh, Tom Zeller and Wendell Finner.

We definitely are looking for one or two members who would be willing to be TUUC's representative to the cluster, as I am going to be stepping back now that the cluster is organized and is a going concern.

The most recent meeting of the cluster was the closing of one chapter and the start of another. Paula Cole-Jones is finishing her time as interim staff member of the Central Region UUA. See below for information about the new Central East-UUA staff member who will be the liaison to both the cluster and congregations in this area including TUUC.

And going forward, the cluster now has two co-chairs; Maria Warburton of the Cedarhurst UU's and Camille Loya of First Church in Baltimore.

From the Central East Region:

Although we're sad to see the interim tenure of the fantastic Paula Cole Jones come to an end on June 30th, we are delighted to

announce that we've hired a new, permanent field staff person to begin with us on July 6th: **Sana Saeed**. Sana has been working as a chaplain at the University of Pennsylvania and is slated to see the Ministerial Fellowship Committee soon to enter Fellowship as a UU minister. You may have interacted with her during her internship and subsequent work at the UU Ministers Association.



We hired Sana because her skill set so closely matches what we've experienced as the variety of needs, hopes and plans for the range of congregations she'll be serving in Maryland, Pennsylvania, the Delmarva peninsula and New Jersey. We see her

as amply able to support and co-create with our congregations in these areas.

Sana will be in touch in the summer months to introduce herself to her primary contact congregations, and you'll see her working with the team with our collaborative efforts as well. Another big new chapter begins for all of us!

STAY CONNECTED THROUGH BREEZE

TUUC uses an online database system called Breeze. All members, friends and visitors are entered into the database for easy dissemination of information from the church such as this newsletter or Sunday service info.
