The 7th-9th OWL class will meet as scheduled at 4:30 pm this Sunday, August 23, in the picnic grove.

We hope you can join us for the August hike/stream walk on August 30 at 2 pm to enjoy a shady walk down to the lake along the streams in the Loch Raven trail. Bring a small container to collect some water from the streams so you can participate in the water sharing at TUUC, which is only 10 minutes away from this trail off of Pot Spring Road.

The Youth Religious Exploration Committee is close to finalizing plans for fall based on the budget available. We plan for all those in grades PreK through 6th to join a zoom meeting at 9 am. On the first Sunday of the month, we will spend about 20 minutes learning about the theme of the month, hearing a story, and sharing the results of projects that have been sent out. After this group time, classes will join in breakout rooms, ending no later than 10 am (sessions for younger groups will be shorter).

On other Sundays, we will meet as a large group for a shorter time so that classes will have a bit longer for their sessions. The grades in each breakout room will depend on

the number of registrants but will probably be PreK through 4th and 5th/6th. We have enough teachers to break up the younger grades if we have enough participants. This group will use the Soul Matters packets that will connect to the monthly themes used by worship planners and sharing circles. The 5th/6th grade teachers are still deciding the best choice for their group.

The 7th/9th grade group and YRUU will both meet at noon on Sundays.

CONTINUING IN VIRTUAL SPACE

The A-Team has decided that our church building will remain closed through December, unless there is significant improvement in reports from the Maryland Department of Health or a widely available safe vaccine. We are permitting small gatherings outside on the church grounds; reservations are required. Our outdoor use procedure is here. Some of our virtual programs are taking a break during the summer. VIRTUAL PROGRAMS AT TUUC

FINDING THE RIGHT BALANCE

The Administrative Team has decided to make it easier for visitors to find their way to our virtual Sunday services, while still maintaining strong security measures to keep out those who might disrupt us.

Our Sunday services still require a password to enter and everyone starts in a waiting room. Everyone enters muted. Participants are not permitted to unmute or rename themselves. Participants may only chat with the host and co-hosts. The password is not embedded in the link to the meeting. The meeting ID changes every week.

In addition to emailing the meeting information to congregants and to repeat visitors, we are starting to include the Zoom meeting ID and password in the Threshold and on the church calendar. Both of these locations require humans to click several times from our church home page, making it less likely that bots will find the link. We will also create a public Facebook event, directing people to contact Zoommtg@towsonuuc.org to obtain the login information.



This is an invitation to drop in to experience the power of writing in community. Twice a month we will gather for an hour on a Friday afternoon. We will introduce ourselves; I will share a quotation and writing prompt; and then we will write together for 10-15 minutes in silence and without stopping. You may choose to write with pen or paper or on a tablet. But please don't remove your face from our virtual meeting. We want to be able to look up and see each other just as our ancestors looked across the fire and saw one another.

At the end, I will ring a chime, inviting everyone to stop writing. Those who wish to do so will share what they have written---without comment, feedback, or judgement. This is sacred sharing and listening. The goal is not to improve one's writing (or to improve someone else's writing!). The goal is to know another and be known.

At the end of the session, the remaining time will be given to conversation on what it felt to write, what someone else's writing brought to mind, what else the prompt prompted in us, etc.

The Reverend Barbara Childs observed, "In a sense, writing as a spiritual practice is meditating on paper to become mindful of who we are. It is a process of paying attention to what matters."

I hope you will join in at least one if not all seven sessions to become mindful of who we are and to pay attention to what matters!

REV. CLARE'S REPORT FROM THE UNITARIAN UNIVERSALIST ASSOCIATION GENERAL ASSEMBLY June 24-28, 2020

One of the workshops I attended at the Unitarian Universalist General Assembly was entitled, "Tricks To Inspire: A Magic Ministry Workshop." Rob Kinslow, a graduate of Star King School For the Ministry, lifted up the importance of magic to help reconnect us with a transcending sense of mystery and wonder. This sense of mystery and wonder strengthens our spirits to do the work of justice. Many of the workshops I attended at the UUA GA affirmed that we are all connected in our desire to do the work to become anti-racist and anti-oppressive as individuals, as institutions, and as a society.

The Rev. Keith Kron and The Rev. Patrice Curtis helped us to explore why we both want and resist diversity as congregations. Genuine diversity will require us to change and to be changed by others. Such transformation, while not easy, is profoundly meaningful. We were asked "Where in your congregation do you find hope that your congregation is radically welcoming of diversity?" Then came the question, "Where in your congregation do you see the need for more hope (i.e., where there is more talk than action.)?"

The Rev. John Buehrens, former President of the Unitarian Universalist Association, spoke of his work researching the spiritual friendships of the Transcendentalists. When he looks to the history of our faith, he finds exemplars of welcoming differences of gender, theology, politics, and even race. He spoke of the friendship of Louis Hayden and John Andrew (among others.) https://www.uuworld.org/articles/spiritual-friendship

Roxanne Dunbar-Ortiz, the author of our Common Read, *An Indigenous People's History of the United States* offered a timeline of the impact of colonialism from the Doctrine of Discovery all the way to expressions of white Nationalism in the United States in 2020. White Nationalism, as a movement, is rooted in the violent theft of land from indigenous people and the enslavement of people from Africa. Many of us did not learn this American history in school and need to learn it now.

The Commission On Institutional Change offered recommendations for "Widening Our Circle Of Concern." They pointed out that "The work of becoming more equitable, inclusive, and diverse within our congregations is justice work. If we cannot do this well, we cannot be effective as justice partners." One of the workshops I attended was on "Theological Grounding For Equity, Inclusion, and Diversity" which invited us to understand our faith not as "one person's right to believe or say anything" but rather as the answer to the question, "What does our

collective salvation look like?" since "We will only be saved by the all of all of us."

Another workshop explored "Reparations Rooted In Repair." This was my introduction to reparations for our country's history of enslaving people from Africa. As one of the speaker's noted, "Racism has done more for white people than affirmative action has done for African Americans." We were strongly encouraged to learn more about H.R. 40 https://www.congress.gov/bill/116th-congress/house-bill/40 and to advocate for its passage.

Naomi Klein began her Ware Lecture with a short video reflecting why the Green New Deal is a plan our country needs to pursue. The clock is striking midnight on the climate crisis. She inspired us to believe that when we treat this climate crisis as an emergency, we will be able, as a country, to meet the challenge. She noted that the original New Deal offered jobs, food, art, and cultivation of the natural world at a time of economic crisis almost 90 years ago. She observed that our country was already in a crisis before the Covid pandemic. Now, we feel like "we are all stuck in a science fiction novel we are writing together." The emphasis was on the power of "we" to do the hard things needed to cultivate and practice an ethos of care and repair for future generations.

Dina Gilio Whitaker, who teaches at California State University, and who wrote As Long as Grass Grows: The Indigenous Fight for Environmental Justice, from Colonization to Standing Rock, also spoke of the need for environmental justice to counter environmental racism. She pointed us to the work of the Rockefeller Foundation and Lancet Commission on Planetary Health.

Morning worship services and special worship like the Service of the Living Tradition reconnected us to the transcending sense of mystery and wonder while also strengthening us for the work of the general assembly plenary sessions and for our work in the wider world. 


