CLARE'S COLLOQUY

Our spiritual question for September is, "What does it mean to be a people of renewal?" This theme was chosen in early April. The hope, then, was that in the United States, the COVID virus would be contained in the late spring and early summer and that we would be gathering in person again to renew our faith community and work together for justice. But that is not how reality has unfolded.

So, what does it mean to be a people of renewal in September of 2020 in the United States?

There are things in our lives that we need to renew---such as prescriptions and a passport, a driver license and a lease, and health and auto insurance. Some things in our digital lives renew automatically (sometimes without warning!) such as subscriptions to magazines and membership in a gym.

But when it comes to relationships, renewal takes intentionality. We speak of renewing friendships and the renewal of marriage vows.

One Unitarian Universalist congregation in the greater Washington area is inviting its members and friends to intentionally "commit to connection" by committing to attend virtual worship and virtual religious exploration and at least one other small group program or socially distanced activity. Why is this important? Because relationships take intentionality. There is an even greater need for such intentionality in a time of social distancing.

This week, a TUUC member e-mailed me the following request, "I am hoping to hear about the value of faith, patience, calm, love and support for each other and the positive side of our human nature in the days ahead...so that our actions can be seen as useful and valuable and effective." While I am happy to speak about these values, the reality is that we give one another faith, calm, love, and support by showing up for each other.

Yes, I know that virtual space is not the same and that we spend too many hours on devices as it is. I also know what it means for two people who haven't "seen" one another for a while to reconnect in virtual space: the broad smiles, the exclamations of delight, the questions of genuine interest and care.

We are in the midst of a difficult and dangerous time in the United States. We need to find new ways to connect to be reminded of the values we cherish. We need one another for support. We need to be reminded that what we do for justice does matter.

So please look through the TUUC newsletter and calendar and commit to connection. If you have an idea for a new small group program you are willing to host in virtual space, or in the TUUC parking lot with social distancing this fall, please speak to me or Andrew Hager. Let us reaffirm the importance of our relationships by creating new ways to bring hope to one another when hope is hard to find even when we can't sing together in person. For this is what it means to be a people of renewal in September of 2020.

VIRTUAL PROGRAMS AT TUUC

FINDING THE RIGHT BALANCE

The Administrative Team has decided to make it easier for visitors to find their way to our virtual Sunday services, while still maintaining strong security measures to keep out those who might disrupt us.

Our Sunday services still require a password to enter and everyone starts in a waiting room. Everyone enters muted. Participants are not permitted to unmute or rename themselves. Participants may only chat with the host and co-hosts. The password is not embedded in the link to the meeting. The meeting ID changes every week.

In addition to emailing the meeting information to congregants and to repeat visitors, we are starting to include the Zoom meeting ID and password in the Threshold and on the church calendar. Both of these locations require humans to click several times from our church home page, making it less likely that bots will find the link. We will also create a public Facebook event, directing people to contact Zoommtg@towsonuuc.org to obtain the login information.

DO YOU KNOW ABOUT THE PARTNER WE SUPPORT?

This month, we highlight the TUUC Social Action Community Partner Our Daily Bread (ODB). Since June 1, 1981, they have never missed a day of lunch service to those experiencing hunger in Baltimore, in spite of blizzards, hurricanes or any other occurrence. Our Daily Bread is Maryland's largest hot meal program, serving more than a quarter of a million meals to those experiencing hunger in Baltimore City each year.

TUUC has pledged to provide at least 60 casseroles to ODB in each month which has 5 Saturdays (usually 4 times per year). <u>October is one of these months.</u> Contributions by individuals and churches serve 600-800 lunch guests each day!

During Covid, we are contributing funds only (\$10 per casserole), not actual cooked casseroles.

HOWEVER YOU VOTE, BE PREPARED!

Mail-in voting is preferred for safety reasons. For the general election, this is a two-stage process: submitting an application for a mail-in ballot and voting the mail-in ballot. You may submit an <u>online ballot application</u>, <u>download and</u> print a ballot application, or return the ballot application that came in the

mail. Whichever option you choose, make your request as soon as possible so that the Board of Elections can get the requests processed and the ballots mailed in a timely fashion. The online application is particularly helpful to the Board as it eliminates the work of processing a paper application, but this option is only available to voters with a Maryland driver's license or state ID card. All applications must be <u>received</u> by the Board of Elections by October 20.

If you request your ballot online, it is best to request that ballot be sent by mail. With electronic delivery, ballots are printed at home. The information on them must be transferred by an election worker to a regular ballot in order to be read by the machine readers. This is very time consuming in a high-volume mail-in election. In general, only voters who need to use the online ballot-marking device or use a screen reader should download a ballot.

<u>VOTE411.org</u> is a League of Women Voters website that allows you to see how the candidates answered the League's questions. It also gives you more details about ballot questions. VOTE411 will go live on September 19. - *Lois Hybl*





ASSISTANCE CENTER OF TOWSON CHURCHES

The Assistance Center of Towson Churches (ACTC) continues to be very busy during the pandemic. It has distributed 160 tons of food to 16,000 people Each client receives canned goods along with fresh produce, dairy and baked goods. Generous



grant from the Maryland Food Bank together with fresh food donations from several stores has made this possible. Area churches have provided storage space for supplies.





GA 2020 REPORT BY STEPHEN FINNER

General Assembly 2020 was quite a different experience from past GA's. I had been looking forward to going to Providence where it was scheduled to be as the last GA I attended "in person" was Providence in 2014. I had purchased my Amtrak ticket and made an Airbnb reservation and was very disappointed when COVID19 turned our world upside down. I had been a "virtual" delegate to the two past GA's, but my activity was limited to the business sessions, which have never been my favorite GA functions.

The first major difference was the absence of a "live choir". I have sung in over a dozen GA choirs and doing so has usually been the high point of my attendance. I was privileged to be one of 150 in the virtual GA choir which sang at the Sunday worship service. The way that works is choristers record their part and email the sound file to the conductor who working with technicians "stitch" all the recordings into one. As you can imagine it is a lot of work.

Because of my experience being a technical usher for our worship services, I volunteered to be a ZOOM chat host at GA. As such, I was involved in four workshops. The downside is I had no choice in which workshops I was participating. The upside is I met some very interesting people and learned quite a few things. My job was to coordinate with the workshop presenters and the technical host, another volunteer position to insure that each of knew who was going to do what, such as handling audio and visual effects, muting and unmuting participants and the like.

The most interesting and moving workshop was a presentation by a Canadian First Nation member, Sharon Jinkerson Brass (First Nation is the Canadian term for their indigenous people) telling the story of how their children were taken around age 6 or 7 and sent to a government run boarding school, supposedly to learn standard academic subjects. However, in addition, they were not allowed to speak their native language and taught to disregard their own culture. The intended effect was to destroy their culture and force assimilation. This practice continued into the 1960's. What struck me about Ms. Brass's presentation is that she was not angry, but understandably very sad. She made clear that the major lesson to be learned from this tragedy was recognition and celebration of the commonality of all humans and honoring everyone's dignity and worth. It was a most poignant and lasting lesson of the importance of our first principle. The Canadian government has established a reconciliation commission in which the Canadian Unitarian Council is quite active. (I can't help mentioning that something very similar is occurring now in China where the ethnic majority Han are sending Muslim Uighurs and Mongolians to "re-education camps".)

Another workshop was "Heart Songs and Circle Songs" conducted by Heather Pierson and Bernice Martin, both currently living in New Hampshire. Heather was the long time Director of Music at the First Universalist Church of Norway, Maine. This workshop was a demonstration of a worship service which "...weaves together influences from the growing singing circle tradition and the contemplative worship tradition." It is a different type of worship experience that is what some might call "soul centered". Rather than try to provide more explanation, you may want to visit their websites (www.heatherpierson.com and www.bernicemartin.me. A third workshop I most enjoyed was Reggie Harris and Greg Greenway's "Deeper than The Skin", a musical presentation on race. "Born three days apart and friends for three decades, one African American from Philadelphia and one white raised in the nostalgia of the South" took the audience through the unflinching and honest story of the ups and downs of their friendship in song. I am privileged to have Reggie as a friend, and I call him a "UU Fellow Traveler". His workshops on music and the civil rights movement and related topics are always worthwhile and you can learn more at <u>https://reggieharrismusic.com</u>.

The highlight of General Assembly 2020 for me was Sunday Morning Worship. The ministers were Rev. Joan Javier Duval and Rev. Mykal Slack. The theme was "Beyond The Waters Edge" and focused on our denomination as it struggles with issues of racial justice and white supremacy while "...also tending to our spiritual needs and caring for others." Both ministers were challenging as well as comforting. The musical director (see my note about the virtual choir above) was Benjie Messer, who serves the large UU congregation in Phoenix, AZ. The service, which I most highly recommend is still available for viewing at <u>https://www.uua.org/ga/off-site/2020/sunday-worship</u>.

Finally, I want to mention the business sessions, which other TUUC attendees have discussed in their reports previously published in The Threshold. There were of course, some glitches, which is quite understandable given the balancing of a complex and changing technology with the demands of creating a virtual environment where a few thousand delegates can participate in a democratic process. That said, I found the sessions to be long on procedural matters and short on substantive ones. There was a considerable struggle with the report of the Commission on Institutional Change which the delegates failed to adopt. This was due to, in my opinion, its complexity and recent release which meant that many if not most delegates (including this one) had not had time to read and absorb it. As always, GA2020, despite being virtual, offered far more events than is possible for any one person to attend. An attendee has to pick and choose and often cannot attend the event or workshop of their first choice. That notwithstanding, GA is always worth the time, effort and expense regardless if it is held in cyberspace or not. One drawback of being virtual is I had to forego the experience of meeting and greeting old friends, joining them for lunch or dinner and reconnecting. At least, my travel time and distance to and from GA events was minimal.
