CLARE'S COLLOQUY

Last Easter, Dr. Neil Porter texted me, "Do you know the response to 'He is risen?" I texted back, "Alleluia?" This guess was rooted in the reality that the Unitarian Universalist congregation in which I was raised focused more on singing Alleluias than on liturgies celebrating the resurrection of Jesus. Neil was clearly disappointed that my theological education did not include the Easter liturgy. He texted back the proper response, "He is risen, indeed."

As we prepare to celebrate our second Easter in virtual space, I have been thinking about the stories of the resurrection. The oldest of the resurrection stories does not have loved ones at a tomb, a stone that needs to be rolled away, or angels. About 20 years after the death of Jesus, Paul tells the Corinthians that Jesus died, was buried, and was raised from the dead on the third day and that he appeared to Peter, to the Twelve, and to many others.

The gospel accounts, which were written 65-110 years after the death of Jesus vary as to which women were at the tomb and how many angels greeted them and what the angels said. What the gospel accounts have in common is that the disciples do not immediately recognize Jesus. In John, Mary mistakes him for a gardener. In Matthew, some of the disciples doubt his appearance. In Luke, the disciples Cleopas and Simon do not recognize Jesus as they walk together on the road to Emmaus. And in John, the resurrected Jesus has to go through a locked door not once, but twice, in order to convince doubting Thomas.

Resurrection does not mean resuscitation. Jesus did not return to live his life as the person he had been. He was not recognized by his disciples. What his disciples sought to embody in their own lives after his death was his legacy of love. At the end of the gospel of John, Jesus instructs Simon Peter, "Feed my sheep."

Our spiritual question for April is, "What does it mean to be a people of becoming?" This particular Easter reminds me that as a people of becoming, we never become who we once were. What resonates is our experience that out of loss and grief new life arises. We are not the same person. But life continues.

Our hope, this Easter, is that we will receive the Covid-19 vaccine; be able to safely hug our family and friends; go back to work; go back to school; and return to our church building. But we will not go back to being who we were before March of 2020. We have been changed by this pandemic. How we do church will also change as a result to ensure that everyone who wants to participate can do so---even when not geographically in the same location.

What will not change is our commitment to become people whose legacy is seeking truth, loving deeply, and working for racial, social, and environmental justice.

Alleluia! He is risen. He is risen indeed!
