CLARE'S COLLOQUY

The Soul Matters Packet for November on "Holding History" begins with this quote from the Quaker theologian Parker Palmer:

"Jewish teaching includes frequent reminders of the importance of a broken-open heart, as in this Hasidic tale: A disciple asks the rebbe: "Why does Torah tell us to 'place these words upon your hearts'? Why does it not tell us to place these holy words in our hearts?" The rebbe answers: "It is because as we are, our hearts are closed, and we cannot place the holy words in our hearts. So we place them on top of our hearts. And there they stay until, one day, the heart breaks and the words fall in." The introduction goes on to observe: "Like those holy words, history in its fullness just sits there until our hearts break open and allow it in."

I was reminded of this story when The Reverend David Carl Olsen invited me to record a prayer for the Channing Commemorative Sunday (formerly known as "Union Sunday".) For decades, congregations near First Unitarian Universalist Church of Baltimore were invited to participate in a service in early May honoring the anniversary of when William Ellery Channing delivered "The Baltimore Sermon" at the ordination of Jared Sparks on May 5, 1819. Channing's sermon defined American Unitarianism in the early 19th century. Often the guest preacher(s) for Union Sunday focused on parts of the sermon, parts of our history, that might shine a light on contemporary Unitarian Universalism.

Because of the pandemic, we did not gather in May of 2021. Instead, First UU of Baltimore celebrated a Channing Commemorative Sunday on October 24th. It was fitting that The Revs. Phyllis Hubbell and John Manwell, who had served First Unitarian Universalist Church of Baltimore for fourteen years, chose to focus on permanent core of our faith from May of 1819 until now. Much has changed in the world in the last 19 months let alone since 1819! What spiritual wisdom do we still place on our hearts until our hearts break open to receive such wisdom?

In an e-mail conversation with Phyllis, she responded, "Here is something that might help with the prayer on images of god from the Baltimore sermon: 'We regard the spirit of love, charity, meekness, forgiveness, liberality, and beneficence as the brightest image we can bear of God, as the best proof of piety.'"

The spirit of love, charity, meekness, forgiveness, liberality, and beneficence. Whatever images of God (or of no God) that we bear in our own faith journeys, we Unitarian Universalists still hold this part of our history with care and gratitude. PROPOSED TUUC REOPENING MATRIX

On October 24, the TUUC Board of Trustees hosted a Listening Session on the plan for re-opening TUUC. For those who missed it, here is what was presented:

Background: During the summer, we had hoped that TUUC would be operating in-person beginning in early September. The highly contagious COVID Delta variant meant that reopening would be more complicated and prolonged. The Board identified the need for a reopening plan and worked with the A-Team to identify protocols for the different risk levels. We agreed to use the levels established by COVID ActNow, whose data comes from official sources including the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, The New York Times, and official state and county dashboards.

Goal: The goal of this document is to provide clarity and transparency around the criteria for making decisions about reopening TUUC for in-person activities. This document is a DRAFT framework and is subject to change depending on metrics. This document is NOT intended to provide final details within each stage or a timeframe for reopening.

The matrix is grounded in our core values, drawn from the UUA:

- Recognition that our risk-taking and our protective actions affect far more than just ourselves in this interdependent web of existence
- Expectation of vaccination and accessibility and inclusion for all of our members and friends to participate in our congregation
- Ethical treatment and expectations for our leaders and staff, minimizing the risks to their own health and well-being
- Seeking consent from those responsible for TUUC programs and activities.
- Our affirmation that good science, coupled with our values, must be the basis on which we make these decisions

Some further notes on the plan

Transitioning from one risk level to another: Metrics need to qualify for 7 days before transitioning, and the minimum time in a phase is 14 days. Transitions are one phase at a time, no skipping. This will allow us to prepare for new programs that may be enabled by the transition from one phase to another. Circumstances may require TUUC to return to a more restrictive phase at any time.

Multiplatform (hybrid) services: We are committed to continuing to provide accessible engagement with TUUC when we are able to transition back to in-person worship and programs. Funds have been budgeted for equipment and for upgrading our internet capacity/speed, as well as for hiring a professional Audio Visual consultant/support staff to run the streaming equipment. We are in the process of developing this capability. Heartfelt thanks to Sue Royer and Ellie Hughes for preparing and presenting this context.

Most of you are aware that when it comes to:

Religious Exploration: Families have been exploring our Unitarian Universalist principles on Sunday afternoons outdoors. We will consider planning for classes indoors when it is safer for our students to be gathered inside.

Music: Singing has been identified as one of the highest risk activities. Instrumental music, soloists and small groups of singers will most likely be phased in earlier due to less risks of transmission.

This matrix is a work in progress. When the A-Team meets, we review the Covid Act Now numbers. This matrix has gone through several iterations between the A-Team and the TUUC Board of Trustees and will continue to do so in the weeks ahead. Our current focus is the technology needed for the participation of those who cannot physically be present in the building.


