This begs the question of "What is joy?" and when and where do we find joy (or does joy find us?)

YOUTH RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

We invite families to join us for a walk with some talk at Hampton Mansion this Sunday from 2 to 3 PM. This family gathering will be on the move to help us stay warm outside. We will meet in the main parking lot outside the visitor center and then walk down to the area that has out buildings, including buildings where enslaved people and, later, tenant farmers lived. These buildings and the exhibits in them are now open after being closed for the previous year. Visiting this site will deepen our discussion of the 8th UU principle that we started last week: We work for a society without racism or other oppressions. CLARE'S COLLOQUY

At a collegial gathering last spring, colleagues watched a video of children in a UU congregation describing what they had done and learned throughout the first year of the pandemic. I was struck by the range of emotions.

On the one hand, many students shared how they missed being with friends at school; missed particular teachers; missed celebrating with friends for birthdays; missed celebrating holidays with families; oh, and they certainly did not like social distancing and wearing masks.

On the other hand, each student shared something positive that they had done or learned or experienced during the pandemic: spending more time with a pet; spending more time with parents; learning how to cook a dish; doing yoga every day; creating a cartoon strip; jumping rope outside; painting; reading books; and dancing! In the midst of what was a difficult time for everyone these children had found, created and shared moments of joy.

In the ancient stories of this season, joy comes in the most challenging and dire of circumstances: people fearing their sources of food had ended; people facing a defiled place of worship after a long and divisive war; a couple making a journey away from the home of the teenager about to give birth with no room for them in the inn. People shout in joy when they realize the light is returning to the land; people rejoice at the miracle of a single jar of oil burning for eight days; and people hear tidings of great joy when the baby is born.

The ancient stories and the narratives of children last spring are a reminder that joy comes in the midst of, not in spite of, hardship. And it is often found in the ordinariness of our days. Brenee Brown writes: Joy comes to us in moments — ordinary moments. We risk missing out on joy when we get too busy chasing down the extraordinary... when you talk to people who have survived great losses, it is clear that joy is not a constant. Without exception, all the participants who spoke to me about their losses, and what they missed the most, spoke about ordinary moments. "If I could come downstairs and see my husband sitting at the table and cursing at the newspaper..." "If I could hear my son giggling in the backyard..." "My mom sent me the craziest texts — she never knew how to work her phone. I'd give anything to get one of those texts right now".

Our spiritual theme for December is "opening to joy." With scary news about the Omicron variant; the economy; social injustices; the viciousness in politics; etc.,---this may seem like an untimely theme!

Perhaps we need to open ourselves to joy--not in spite of these realities--but because of them. Perhaps we need to open ourselves to the joy to be found in the ordinariness of our days. We will do so on December 5 as we reflect on times when we were surprised by joy and on December 12 when we remember where the Buddha sought and found enlightenment. And if opening to joy seems too difficult, there will be an "elusive joy" or "Blue Holiday" service at 7:30 p.m. on the evening of Dec. 10. You will not want to miss our multigenerational service on December 19th. Our students have recorded an ancient story for us to enjoy! For Christmas Eve, at 5 p.m. you are invited to bring an ornament to your device that sparks joy and be prepared to share its story. At 7:30 p.m. we will celebrate a more traditional service focused on sharing joy. For either or both services, please bring a candle to your device so that we can "pass" the flame while singing "Silent Night."

May we experience moments of joy in the midst of all that is unknown in December. May we share our joy with others. For as the UU students reminded us such sharing brings joy to the world!



REOPENING PLANS SIMPLIFIED

CCH is dedicated to helping men experiencing homelessness rebuild their lives and to changing attitudes toward homelessness through outreach and education. Earl's Place, which is a stepping stone on the way to attaining a permanent home, houses 17 men at a time.
