PROGRESS PRIDE FLAG: WIDENING THE LQBTQ WELCOME BY SUE ROYER, BOARD PRESIDENT

Have you been to TUUC in person since we re-opened? Look for our new Progress Pride flag hanging in the lobby!

I first became aware of the Progress Pride flag at the 2021 General Assembly of UUs. It's the well-known gay pride flag, redesigned in 2018 by Daniel Quasar to bring focus on inclusion and progress within the community.

According to Wikipedia, the "'Progress' variation adds a chevron along the hoist that features black, brown, light blue, pink, and white stripes to bring those communities to the forefront (the communities being marginalized people of color, trans individuals, and those living with HIV/AIDS and those who have been lost); the arrow points to the right to show forward movement, while being along the left edge shows that progress still needs to be made."


We also have a new outdoor sign

on order, to replace the one that was destroyed by a car cash. Our new sign will have a colorful Progress Pride flag as the background behind a chalice.

WHY TUUC NEEDS THE PROPOSED 8TH PRINCIPLE

At our Annual Meeting on Sunday, June 12th, our congregation will be voting on a resolution to endorse the proposed 8th Principle: "We, the member congregations of the Unitarian Universalist Association, covenant to affirm and promote: journeying toward spiritual wholeness by working to build a diverse multicultural Beloved Community by our actions that accountably dismantle racism and other oppressions in ourselves and our institutions."

Although the TUUC Board, exemplifying the need, already approved the adoption of the 8th Principle in 2021, our congregation needs to vote for it for TUUC to become one with the approximately 156 UU churches that have, to date, adopted it. We would be joining with those churches who have seen, as we could, the need for an additional Principle to specifically name our commitment to becoming a more inclusive community. Endorsing the 8th Principle would enable us to embrace the opportunity to increase our awareness and to live more fully our TUUC Mission Statement: "to deepen our ethical and spiritual lives together as we work for racial, social, and environmental justice."

Likewise, our TUUC Vision Statement, "to be an intentionally inclusive community, engaging with each other and the world in a heartfelt search for truth and meaning," would be more fully realized, as would our dedication to our other 7 vision-focused Principles. The proposed 8th Principle is a call to action: accountable, concrete, measurable actions. Because there is "no mention of racism and other oppressions, specifically" in the existing 7 Principles, some see this as "a conspicuous omission."


The 8th Principle contextualizes where the work of justice needs to be done. Endorsing it increases both the understanding and acknowledgement of issues of racism and oppression and, as a Beloved Community, doing what we can, individually and as a congregation, to wholeheartedly address and restore our society's history and current climate of glaring inequalities. Let us come together on June 12th at our Annual Meeting and vote unanimously in favor to adopt the proposed 8th Principle...for ourselves, for our congregation, for our community, and for the world.




