YOUTH RELIGIOUS EXPLORATION

We had a good turnout and good discussion of the movie Hidden Figures last Friday night. Our next movie will be Remember the Titans, also sponsored by Cabin Fever and the 8th Principle Team, at 6:30 pm on Friday, May 13. Children in the Kindergarten through 5th class have been and will be exploring the topic of Awakening through stories and other activities, including games, art projects and yoga. As the weather improves, we look forward to more time outdoors in nature and on the playground.

Those in middle school have been learning about justice-making through the calls for empathy, understanding, and courage. We have discussed UU heroes such as Frances Ellen Watkins and Rev. Waitstill Sharp and Martha Sharp, as well as immigration, how to be an ally, and the continuum of anti oppressive behavior.

Teens have also been discussing the theme of Awakening and the service-learning opportunity in rural West Virginia run by Big Creek People in Action, which works to improve housing and health for their community. We will know soon if we have enough teens and adults for a trip this June or if we will hold off until next year. CLARE'S COLLOQUY

We see the daffodils, cherry blossoms, forsythia and we are reassured that new life is awakening from winter. "Awakening" comes from the Old English "awæcnan" which means to "spring into being, arise, originate." But how do our spirits awaken in this time of war in Europe; this time when the Governor of Florida has signed the bill "Don't Say Gay" into law; this time when many states are passing bills making it less likely that women will be able to access an abortion; this time when the first black woman to ever be nominated to the Supreme Court was asked ridiculous questions reflecting that systemic racism is alive and well in the United States?

The Abrahamic faiths all have holidays this month which encourage awakening: Ramadan offers the possibility of literally awakening to new revelations at dawn and celebrating insights gained through fasting, study, and prayer with a feast in the evening; Easter offers the possibility of awakening to new life after loss and death; and Passover offers the possibility of awakening to liberation from oppression.

What is your own story of awakening?

The Reverend Frederick Buechner wrote, "The sight of the Atlantic Ocean can do it, or a piece of music, or a face you've never seen before. A pair of somebody's old shoes can do it. Almost any movie made before the great sadness that came over the world after the Second World War, a horse cantering across a meadow, the high school basketball team running out onto the gym floor at the start of a game. You can never be sure. But of this you can be sure. Whenever you find tears in your eyes, especially unexpected tears, it is well to pay the closest attention. They are not only telling you something about the secret of who you are, but more often than not...the mystery of where you have come from and is summoning you to where, if your soul is to be saved, you should go to next."

May such awakenings be yours this April.

ORDINATION OF KARYN MARSH

On Saturday, May 7, 2022, our own Karyn Bergmann Marsh will be ordained as a Unitarian Universalist minister by the Towson Unitarian Universalist Church. Answering the call to ministry is more than just a career choice. Being ordained into professional religious leadership is a lifechanging event, both for the new minister and for any congregation or organization they may serve.

Ordination is one of the most important traditions of our faith. A congregation's decision to ordain someone represents the congregation's faith in, and support for, the ordinand's ministry. In the UU tradition, the ritual of ordination allows the minister to use the title of Reverend. As a formal recognition of entry into service as a UU minister, ordination offers an invitation to individual and communal transformation, as well as an opportunity to serve our faith in the world. Ordination isn't just about one person's ministry. In the UU tradition, authority to ordain ministers rests squarely with the congregation. To highlight the significance and rarity of this event to our congregation, TUUC hasn't ordained a new minister since 1999.

Karyn's journey toward ministerial ordination has included TUUC at almost every step. She's been deeply committed to TUUC from the day she signed the TUUC membership book in 2008 to the present day. She's served tirelessly on multiple committees, been a member of the choir, served as a Lay Worship Associate, was the Membership Committee chair for six years, and spent more than eight years combined on the Board of Trustees and Operations Team, always working for the betterment of TUUC, our community, the Unitarian Universalist Association, and the world at large. She currently serves as an Affiliate Community Minister of TUUC. After an intensive threeyear program, Karyn graduated from the Starr King School for the Ministry in Berkeley, CA in May 2020 with a Masters of Divinity degree. She also served as a ministerial intern at All Souls Unitarian of Tulsa from August 2020 until May 2021 and provided ministerial support to the UU fellowship of Charlestown in Catonsville, MD. Following a rigorous evaluation process the UUA accepted her into Preliminary Fellowship, a necessary step toward ordination. In June 2021, the congregation voted unanimously to ordain Karyn into the UU ministry. She is currently serving as a Chaplain at the Johns Hopkins Hospital, providing support to patients, their families, and staff. The celebration of ordination is a deeply moving ceremony that will involve TUUC's congregation, Unitarian Universalists far and wide who have mentored and counseled Karyn on her journey, and Karyn's friends and family. The joyful ceremony will include hymns, songs, and readings, the presentation of gifts, and the laying of hands, a particularly poignant element where the congregation joins as one living body to bless Karyn as she makes her first steps on her chosen path. The service will be presented both in-person and online via zoom. As one of the first live events at TUUC since early 2020, the ordination will also be a celebration of the congregation's return to in-person gatherings.

The Board of Trustees has budgeted \$7,200 for Karyn's ordination - the ceremony itself, a reception for all attendees (pie will be served, of course), a dinner for select guests, and transportation and lodging for our guest minister. TUUC has established a special drive to assist in the collection of additional funds that may be needed. Any collected funds above those needed for Karyn's ordination will be transferred to TUUC's Building Fund. 

The Board of Trustees chose these focus areas for the Stewardship campaign:


- gathering in person at church for worship, while concurrently opening our online doors by streaming from the meeting room, leveraging new equipment and an upgraded network.




