
### Mní wičhóni!

This is part of the One Room Schoolhouse program where all students, ages 5-18 are together to learn, play, and build community.



## THE FACES OF DEPRESSION: MAY 1, MAY 8, MAY 15, AND MAY 20

May is National Mental Health Awareness Month. One of the major mental health issues of our time is depression. Statistics show that 20 percent of adult Americans can expect to experience clinical depression at least once.

In the 18th and 19th century, depression, also known as melancholia, was thought to be a character trait that was



inherited and could not be changed. Today, we understand it as a disease that can be treated. Nevertheless, there is much about depression that is still not understood, and stigma attached to depression remains a problem. For those suffering from depression and those close to them, depression can seem mysterious and impossible to cure.

In this 4-week course, led by Rev. Karyn Marsh, who is a chaplain at Johns Hopkins Hospital, participants will learn to recognize the signs and symptoms of depression, about treatments for depression, and how to support those who are experiencing depression. While this course is designed for those who are supporting people with depression, it will also offer resources for participants to tend to their own mental health.

The first three classes will be held via zoom on Mondays, May 1, May 8, and May 15, from 7 pm until 8 pm. The final class session will be in-person at TUUC on May 20 from 1 pm until 3 pm. ### NAMING THE NEW TRAIL


Have you walked the recently constructed trail that runs through the woods on our property? We are grateful to those who have helped establish this path. Their work has provided us a place for contemplation and observation.

At this moment, the trail is unnamed. At their most recent meeting in March, members of the Board proposed calling it the TUUC Ancestors Trail. The intention was to acknowledge, not only those members of our congregation who have come before us, but also the previous stewards of our land. The path travels from the Memorial Garden to the Thoreau Meadow across grounds that were once worked by enslaved Africans and, before that, controlled by the Piscataway- Conoy Nation. Under this proposal, we will work to create a marker explaining the history of the land and acknowledging the previous inhabitants. This marker will be dedicated upon its installation.



### **DONATIONS AT TUUC**

When the General Assembly adjourned "sine die" 4/10/2023, 30 of UULM-MD's 67 priority bills had passed (45%). In terms of issues (rather than individual bills), the record is even better: 20 of 36 issues (56%).
