CLARE'S COLLOQUY

Many years ago, in Missoula, Montana, when a Jewish family put a menorah in their window for Hanukkah, a rock was thrown through the window. The editor of the town paper not only ran a story about this vandalism, he also published a full-page picture of a menorah. He asked all the people in the town---regardless of their religious identity---to post the menorah in their own windows. The majority of townspeople did to say, "Whatever you do to my neighbor, you do to me."

I was reminded of this story at the end of July. In the early hours of July 23, the Unitarian Universalist Community Church of Plano, Texas had its front doors intentionally set on fire by arsonists. The congregation held Sunday morning worship as planned several hours later. It is not known who the arsonists are. It IS known that four individuals appeared during Sunday worship on June 25th to video themselves mocking our Unitarian Universalist welcome of LGBTQ folk and to heckle the preacher during worship. They posted a video of this "visit" on YouTube on July 12. The police have not yet been able to establish a connection between this video (which garnered over 200,000 views) and the arson. But the Anti-Defamation League and GLAAD have tracked more than 350 incidents of harassment, vandalism and assault motivated by anti-LGBTQ rhetoric in an 11-month span beginning last June. Texas had the third highest number of anti-LGBTQ incidents in the country.

So, what does this have to do with the Hanukkah story in Missoula, Montana? Well, the Dallas Morning News not only covered this story on June 23 and June 24, "Anti-LGBTQ YouTubers trolled a progressive Plano church. It was firebombed weeks later," they also published a letter to the editor entitled, "Stand Against Hate" by the Reverend Matt Gaston, lead pastor of First United Methodist Church of Plano. He noted that his church shares a community garden with Community Unitarian Universalist Church. He went on to write that United Methodists share the UU's "gracious inclusive stance of LGBTQ persons." Then he observed:

"The attack...comes two months after the Allen Outlets shooting and after consecutive Easters when a self-confessed hate group placed antisemitic fliers under the windshield wipers of cars in our parking lot.

Plano police investigated but say it is difficult to track down the culprits with a chargeable hate crime.

Therefore it is upon us as residents and persons of faith to remain diligent, prayerful and in solidarity with one another in our stance of love against hate in all its forms.

This does not come without a price. Jesus' life is ample witness to that.

We have placed on our outdoor sign, "Hate has no home here, nor with our Unitarian Universalist neighbors."

I invite all residents and persons of faith to join us in that stance.

I have not heard how many people, in the last week, have put up a sign that says, "Hate has no home here, nor with our Unitarian Universalist neighbors."

I am grateful for Rev. Gaston's leadership. It reminds me of the stand the neighbors in Missoula, Montana took when they put menorahs in their windows.

"Whatever you do to my neighbor, you do to me."

Such courageous affirmations illuminate the world in every season.

COMMUNITY PARTNER UPDATE: MENTORING MALE TEENS IN THE HOOD, BY SUE ROYER

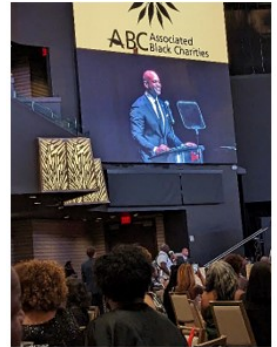

DONATIONS AT TUUC

SOCIAL ACTION PLANNING MEETING—SUNDAY, AUGUST 13 AT 12:15 PM

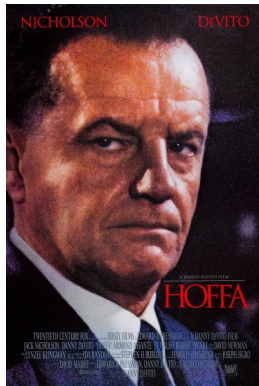

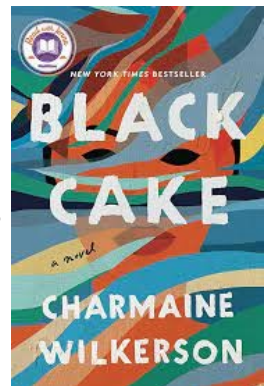
