CLARE'S COLLOQUY

When you think of the gift of welcome, what comes to mind?

Do you imagine Beowulf being presented with gifts of gold such as Seamus Heaney described in his translation of the Old English epic?

The cup was carried to him, kind words spoken in welcome and a wealth of wrought gold graciously bestowed: two arm bangles, a mail-shirt and rings, and the most resplendent torque of gold I ever heard tell of anywhere on earth or under heaven.

The word "welcome" comes from the Anglo-Saxon, and is used in *Beowulf*. "Wilcuma" means wil (pleasure) plus cuma (guest.) The verb form, wilcumian, meant to receive someone or something with pleasure.

However, a sign of pleasure need not be two arm bangles or a resplendent torque of gold! I was reminded of this in a small Scottish village this summer. I was serving as a golf caddy for my father. I met a student who hopes to come to the United States in another year to serve as a professional golf caddy. In the golf shop, one morning, he introduced himself to me: My name is Finley. He asked my name. Then Finley introduced me to the two other people in the golf shop by name: Linda and Mark. Each time I saw Finley after that, he greeted me by name and asked how I was doing and how Ralph's (my father's) golf round had gone. Finley modeled the practice of receiving another with pleasure---by remembering their name and by being sincerely interested in others.

In worship on August 13th, SarahRuth Davis, our Ministerial Intern, and her daughter Adelia modeled ways they welcome each other with a hug and with an affirmation. They then invited us to reflect on how we like to be welcomed and to welcome others. One person reported they'd like to be welcomed with a short song. Another equated welcoming with being showered with loving words. Newlyweds shared how they welcome each other by sharing a kiss. Another person wanted to be called by their name and told that they are welcome here. And another person said, they "would love to be treated with genuine happiness to see me and interest in my life."

The gift of welcome is the gift of being seen, of being heard, of being known, of being affirmed, of belonging. This is a gift we give and receive in religious community. We don't have to wait for a warrior to show up on our doorstep. We don't have to sing a song on key. We don't even have to like to hug people or to be hugged! Finley reminded me the gift of welcome starts with learning the name of another person. It grows when that person is introduced to others by their names. Questions about another lead to connections that build beloved community over time. Welcome back to TUUC (or to TUUC for the first time!). Welcome to being received by others and to receiving others with pleasure!

SOUL MATTERS SHARING CIRCLES REGISTRATION BY SEPTEMBER 12

Autumn is a time for the first day of the new school year; for the Jewish high holy days, remembering the beginning of the world and marking the start of a new year; and, perhaps, for committing to a new spiritual practice.

Our Soul Matters Sharing Circles will begin meeting on Zoom on September 26 to explore the monthly theme. Prior to gathering, you will receive a packet of possible spiritual practices; questions on the theme; and readings. Participants are invited to choose one spiritual practice to engage and one question to reflect upon. In a circle of six to ten people, we share our experience with the practice and our thoughts on the question. We learn more about ourselves and connect with others on a deeper level.

This year's themes are based on the values articulated in the proposed Article II revision which delegates to the UUA General Assembly will vote upon next June.

This year's overarching frame is *The Gifts of Our Faith*. We focus on ten beloved UU values and explore their potential to shape us and in turn shape the world.

How do these values offer us both challenge and comfort? What might it mean to place them at the center of our living and loving? What promise do they hold for us individually as well as collectively? These are some of questions that will guide and bless our journey in the year ahead.

Here is the list of our 2023-24 themes: *The Gift of...*

September: Welcome
October: Heritage
November: Generosity
December: Mystery
January: Liberating Love
February: Justice & Equity
March: Transformation
April: Interdependence

May: Pluralism June: Renewal

This year, we will experiment with meeting once a month for 1.5-2 hours (instead of twice a month). Therefore, we are asking participants to commit to meeting once a month so that we can really get to know one another. We understand that something may come up that will require missing a meeting or two. But these are not stand alone sessions. We are scheduled to meet on Sept. 26, Oct. 24, Nov. 28, Dec. 12, Jan. 30, Feb. 27, March 26, April 23, May 28, and June 11th . We meet from 7:30 - 9:00 PM. on Zoom.

OUR MESSY LIVES TO PROBE THE WORD "REVOLUTION" ON THURSDAY, SEPTEMBER 14

Have we ever disagreed with something so passionately that we would like to commence a **REVOLUTION**? Such as to preserve **Democracy**? To preserve the **Earth**? To uphold **human** rights, equality, justice, and compassion, when we believe they're being denied?

How does a **REVOLUTION** begin? Who can start one? A **REVOLUTION** is "a fundamental change in a political organization," or in the way things are done, or in the way business is conducted. It can be peaceful or turbulent. It is meant to overthrow, repudiate, and thoroughly replace the existing status quo.

If we were to believe in something so vehemently and whole-heartedly, how could we become the catalyst for a **REVOLUTION**? Have we seen one in our lifetime? How about The Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., in 1963, making change by the March on Washington and his "I Have a Dream" speech on the Mall? It was **revolutionary**, for sure, 60 years ago! FARMING FOR THE FUTURE—SYSTEMIC CHANGES FOR THE CLIMATE CRISIS—SEPT 26-28

Join UUs for Just Economic Community, UUs for Social Justice, Side with Love and UU Ministry for Earth in Washington, D.C. September 26-28, 2023 to learn about our food and farming system and to advocate for an equitable and climate-smart 2023 Farm Bill. If you eat food, you care about the Farm Bill—even if you don't know it! The farm bill connects the food on our plates, the farmers and ranchers who produce that food, and the natural resources—our soil, air, and water — that make growing food possible.

Congress puts forward only every five years a must-pass farm bill that determines the kind of food and farm system we have. Congress is writing the 2023 Farm Bill NOW. So NOW is the time for our UU voices to be heard. Farm bills address many issues UUs care about including food quality and food chain security, soil and water contamination, food deserts, equity for small-scale producers, conservation, research, crop insurance, and nutrition programs like SNAP (formerly food stamps).

The first two days (Tuesday and Wednesday) will feature speakers and the last day (Thursday) will be direct advocacy with U.S. senators. There will be a concert with Jim Scott on Tuesday evening and a worship service on Wednesday evening, both at All Souls Unitarian in DC. 


