CLARE'S COLLOQUY

When you think of love, what images come to mind? The Valentine's made from doilies in grade school? How an older relative signed their letters? The first contemporary to tell you they loved you? What you felt when you held your child for the first time? What you read were the last recorded words of some of the people on the planes of 9/11? One option for a reaction on social media? Or something else?

When you hear the phrase "liberating love" what images come to mind? Freedom from an addiction one day at a time? Talking to a counselor without fear judgment? Finding your soul mate who accepts you for who you are without trying to change you? Joining with others to witness and to march, for civil rights, for reproductive justice, for immigrant rights, for peace?

A recent article in the New York Times added to the images I carry of liberating love. It was not about a rom com or a Hallmark Christmas movie. It was not about people who normally speak the word "love" in their daily routines. It was not about a documentary for justice.

It was about a place where people are not free: the largest prison in Chile, with 5,600 inmates.

In this most unlikely of settings, the prisoners had developed a relationship with the 300 feral cats who were there before them. One inmate said, "A cat makes you worry about it, feed it, take care of it, give it special attention...When we were outside and free, we never did this. We discovered it in here."

In return, the cats provide affection and acceptance.

When he is released, one inmate, who still has two years to serve, is already planning to take with him the cat he met as a kitten, named, and has cared for since kittenhood.

The gift of liberating love is our theme this month. We are not living in an overcrowded prison. We do not have feral cats roaming around TUUC. Yet we come together to be reminded of, and to pay attention to, that which our lives meaning and purpose: love.

The revised Article II proposal reads, "Love is the power that holds us together and is at the center of our shared values. We are accountable to one another for doing the work of living our shared values through the spiritual discipline of Love."

The prisoners in Chile are very clear about what the spiritual discipline of Love asks of them in terms of caring for the cats and helping volunteers to spay and neuter the kittens. They are very clear about what they receive in return (which they were not mindful of when they were free.)

What will the spiritual discipline of Love ask of you in the coming year? What relational gifts of liberating love do we, as a beloved community, hope to receive?

GREEN SANCTUARY TIP OF THE WEEK

Artificial light at night negatively impacts wildlife and can disrupt their migratory patterns. Help the critters in your local ecosystem. Rather than leaving exterior lights on at night, put your lights on motion sensors so that they turn on when needed. This can be safer, too, as it will alert you to movement in the area (be it animal or human!) In addition, using yellow (rather than white) exterior lights tends to have less impact on wildlife.

A PLACE TO STAND—A WRITING/CREATIVITY WORKSHOP FOR TRAUMA SURVIVORS, LED BY KRIS FAATZ

Meeting on Zoom on Monday evenings 1/8, 1/22, 2/12, and 2/26, this workshop will provide a safe space for trauma survivors to use creativity as a recovery tool. Participants can explore their experiences honestly, with a focus on reclaiming and reinforcing their sense of self/ identity, their self-trust, and their ability to access feelings of peace, safety, and delight. Each meeting will begin with a short free-writing exercise in response to a piece of music, and will continue with one primary thought question in which participants will engage with their thoughts about themselves, what they've experienced, and/or how they have emerged on the other side of the challenges they faced. Each meeting will also include one or two creative exercises which emphasize self-expression and conveying personal truth. Participants will be invited to share their responses to thought questions and exercises if they wish, but sharing is never required. Each session will begin at 7 PM and last about 90 minutes.
