
YOUTH RELIGIOUS EXPLORATION

CLARE'S COLLOQUY

"How radical can we be given the threat of authoritarianism?" This was the question asked at the Religious Leaders Caucus of BRIDGE Maryland in January. "How radical can we be given the threat of authoritarianism?" What is your answer?

Unitarian Universalist colleagues have been sharing the organizations to which they are giving money as we approach the November elections in the United States. This is one way to address the threat of authoritarianism---support organizations that are working to defend democracy.

Regardless of the results of the November election, authoritarianism is on the rise around the globe. Authoritarianism promises certainty in the face of fear. Economic inequality; wars pushing the Doomsday clock for nuclear war moving to 90 seconds before midnight; and climate change all contribute to feelings of fear. Democracy requires that people live with uncertainty. But in the face of fear, it is hard to remain open to uncertainty.

How radical can we be given the threat of authoritarianism? The answer may sound simple: build relationships across identities and communities. This is how we discover shared interests. Finding shared interests is how people organize power. If you have any doubts about this, follow the organizing that was done over the last half century to generate enough people, money, and power to overturn Roe V. Wade.

The final revision of the proposed Article II of the Unitarian Universalist Association defines justice as working "to be diverse multicultural Beloved Communities where all thrive" and the practice as "dismantling racism and all forms of systemic oppression" and supporting "the use of inclusive democratic processes to make decisions within our congregations, our Association, and society at large." The gift of justice is intimately linked to the practice of democracy which has a certain process even if the outcome is uncertain. (By way of contrast, in authoritarianism promises certainty but the process is an unaccountable centralized power.)

When it comes to building relationships across identities and communities, the proposed Article II of the Unitarian Universalist Association defines equity as "every person has the right to flourish with inherent dignity and worthiness" and the practice as "using our time, wisdom, attention, and money to build and sustain fully accessible and inclusive communities.

So perhaps the answer to "how radical can we be given the threat of authoritarianism?" is to live our values as Unitarian Universalists: to not react to fear with more fear; to not be pulled into the certainty of a rigid worldview; to intentionally build relationships across identities and communities with the goal of building power; and to advocate for the use of inclusive democratic processes. How radical can we be given the threat of authoritarianism? Together, may we live into the answer(s).

SOCRATES CAFÉ TO DISCUSS CULTURAL APPROPRIATION—MONDAY, FEBRUARY 19

TUUC regular, Jeff Savoye, suggested that we probe the question, "Is cultural appropriation really a thing, and, if so, is it a bad thing?" at our upcoming Monday, February 19th TUUC Zoom Socrates Cafe from 7:30-9:00 PM.

For those of us who need some background to the whole subject, a BBC 8:40 YouTube Video, "Cultural Appropriation: Whose problem is it?" (produced by BBC Stories) provides a helpful explanation of cultural appropriation. There are multiple other YouTubes to watch, including the Blue Cross/Blue Shield of Minnesota 52 seconds YouTube, "What is cultural appropriation?" There are several useful and informative TED Talks, too.

In depth explanations can be found by Googling several articles in The New York Times. One such article, dated 9/30/22, explains <u>"What Does Cultural Appropriation Really Mean?"</u>
Another, a 6/14/17 NYT op-ed, <u>"In Defense of Cultural Appropriation,"</u> discusses how racism and marginalization play into the discussion.

Should clothing be culturally appropriated? There has been intense backlash online for endorsing cultural appropriation, broadly defined in a Truthdig NYT piece as "the practice of using certain elements from another culture without the consent of people who belong to that culture." When is it a "bad thing?" Is it ever a "bad thing?" How so? Why so? Can it be disrespectful? Offensive? Inappropriate? Harmful? Exploitative? Intentional? Unintentional?

In <u>"Three Cheers for Cultural Appropriation,"</u> written by Time contributor Bari Weiss, Weiss argues that "borrowing from other cultures is "not only what makes American culture so rich, but is also a big part of the reason America is so successful." So should culture be shared, but not hoarded? Borrowed as homage, and not as derision? Yoga? Hoop earrings? Should white people have a say in deciding what constitutes cultural appropriation?

ACTC needs nonperishable foods, especially hearty soups.


NONPERISHABLE FOOD


