

CLARE'S COLLOQUY

At the beginning of March, I met with colleagues for an on-line spiritual retreat. We had each received a package which we were instructed to not open until told.

The facilitator shared that what was in each package was a puzzle. But the pieces had been sent in a jumble and without any image. Without a picture to guide us, we were to spend the remaining time bringing the hidden picture into view

The first thing I did was to invite my spouse to join me at the dining room table with this jumble of pieces. He said, "What? There's no picture?! OK. Look for the borders." I'd heard, "Look for the helpers," but never "Look for the borders." But I did as he advised. It took some time, but we finally had the frame of the puzzle together on all four sides. Then we set to work on the center. By the time I had to re-gather with colleagues, some flowers and a bird's claws holding a branch had emerged from the chaos.

I listened to how other colleagues had gone about revealing the story of their puzzle. Several were of the "make the border first" school. Others just looked for shapes and colors that might go together. We were asked to consider how this practice imitates the slow work of God/Spirit flowing through our lives.

Earlier this week, we met again for our on-line spiritual retreat. I was able to share that when Don and I completed the puzzle, one piece was missing. I didn't know if it had been planned to have one piece missing as a metaphor for life's unfolding...there's always an unknown! Apparently, it had not been planned!

This month our Soul Matters theme is the gift of interdependence. Often we Unitarian Universalists speak of the "web" of interdependence. The puzzle pieces with the emerging image of a bird surrounded by flowers and greenery encouraged me to slow down and pay attention to what is in the web and how we are connected.

What do you find yourself noticing as spring literally unfolds new life? What borders are you finding or seeking to frame the story of your life? Upon whom and what are you dependent in this interdependent web? And what one piece has yet to come into view? In the words of Sharon Salzburg, "Patience means being wholeheartedly engaged in the process that is unfolding, rather than ripping open a budding flower or demanding a caterpillar to hurry up and get that chrysalis stage over with."

To help us explore, together, what is in the web and how we are connected, we will, on April 7, welcome visitors from the Baltimore American Indian Museum who will share, through dance, their understanding of our interdependence. On Earth Day, we will welcome Patty Mochel from the Green Towson Alliance to speak to us of native plants. SarahRuth Davis, our Ministerial Intern, will lead us in contemplating our longing(s) on April 14. And we will conclude with Thich Nhat Hanh's concept of interbeing.


